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



Two of Wightlink's more unusual 'vessels' went to drydock over the winter, having many years of seaweed scraped off the bottom.

The Hulk Moorings are made up of two support barges and sit in the middle of the entrance to Portsmouth Harbour, adjacent to Wightlink's fuel tanker barge. They are used to supply all of our ferries and FastCats with marine gas oil (diesel).

Wightlink's Hulk Moorings were probably named after an earlier Hulk that was brought into the harbour in 1904 and moored off Gosport. It stored Welsh coal used by the Royal Navy ships at the nearby Dockyard and operators used four large cranes on top of it to refuel the tugs and battleships. After 60 years of service – including two world wars, coal was replaced by diesel and the original Hulk was eventually towed away in 1964 to a breaker's yard.

LIFE RINGS

Lions and lemurs at the Isle of Wight's Wildheart Animal Sanctuary have been thrown a playtime 'lifeline' by Wightlink, after we donated old life rings for the animals to enjoy.

The life-saving devices were previously on board the Lymington to Yarmouth ferry Wight Sun but have now been retired from service and replaced with new ones.

Having previously donated old mooring lines to the Sandown attraction, we were keen to upcycle the life rings, diverting them from landfill. They make perfect swings for the lemurs and ideal scratching and chewing toys for the lions.

Wightlink is a proud supporter of the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary. In recent years the company has provided crossings for rescued animals including tigers, pigs, owls, a cockatoo, porcupines, Rankins Dragons and a giant rabbit.



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To get things started, we couldn't think of a much cosier spot to begin the day than at the Chocolate Apothecary on Ryde Esplanade. Glistening inside with patterned tiles, this former Victorian fishmonger's shop is now an elegant emporium of cocoa, with owner Susan Van Praagh turning fair trade Tanzanian and Javan chocolate into a tasteful array of tempting delights. Try their rich, dark chilli hot chocolate for starters, followed by a fruity florentine or a slice of ovenfresh brownie. On your way out, perhaps pick up a box of handmade chocolates as well (to share with someone special or to leave on a certain doorstep), with options including spiced chai, salted caramel, strawberry champagne and espresso.






Just a short stroll eastwards, you'll come across the enchanting Appley Tower – a picturesque seaside folly, ideal for re-enacting a Romeo and Juliet moment from the legendary landmark's steps. If however, you're looking to pick up some tools and create something unique with your significant other then head inland to Arreton Barns. Here you'll find the workshop of Thomas P Cochran, a family-run silversmith business, first established in Mauritius and specialising in stunning marine-inspired jewellery. Ring-making workshops are held by their son (also called Thomas) who will show you how to twist and hammer a one-of-a-kind piece – which may well come in handy if a wedding or engagement is on the cards soon.

As lunchtime approaches, we'd suggest reserving a table in the snug wood-clad interior of Smoking Lobster in Cowes. Set up by brother and sister GC and Cinz, the restaurant specialises in modern Pan-Asian cuisine (drawing on elements from the pair's Chinese ancestry) and provides the perfect setting for first dates as well as family gettogethers. Menu options include a miso black cod with apple, kohlrabi and wasabi tartare, the shio koji chicken skewers with peanut satay espuma or the Chinese turnip cake with sweet and sour asparagus, kimchi and a tempura quail egg. To fill those glasses, maybe try a snifter of super smooth sake rice wine or ask Cinz for her personal recommendations when it comes to Japanese whiskies.

Perhaps you're taking a break from dating this Valentine's Day, in which case, round up your friends and check yourselves in for an afternoon of well-deserved pampering at Lakeside Park. Set beside the tranquil tidal waters of Wootton Creek, this hotel and spa comes complete with a 10-metre indoor pool (with added hydro jets), a sauna, steam room and jacuzzi too.


You can also sign yourself up for some feel-good treatments such as the refreshing lime and ginger cleansing scrub or the nourishing frangipani body wrap (where you'll be rolled up in a warm, aromatic cocoon). If at the end of the day, you just can't pull yourself away from all that pampering, then maybe book yourself into one of the Lakeside's 42 tasteful en suite bedrooms. That way, you can do it all again in the morning!

If, on the other hand, you're spending the day as a family, then you could always spread the love with a trip south to the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary, just outside Wroxall. Set up in 1991, over one hundred donkeys and ponies now call this place home, each and every one having been rescued or re-homed – some from as far away as France. Adults and older children can take part in a 15-minute donkey grooming session (which apparently always comes with lots of cuddles) or maybe the two-hour-long donkey experience where they can really get to know donkeys such as Archie, Coffee and Wilfie, helping to feed them, brush them and keep their stable nice and shipshape too.



As evening falls, you can't go wrong with a romantic walk along the rocky shore at Seaview. Once you reach the Puckpool end, why not round things off with a special meal in the snug, nautical interior of The Boathouse? Here, chefs Joel and Massimo use their gastronomic know-how (and a fair few locally sourced ingredients) to create a range of appetising options, including the prosciutto-wrapped monkfish tail with passata and dill chateau potatoes. Diners could also plump for the twelve-hour braised beef with Emmental cheese, or even the wild mushroom pappardelle, served with truffle and a scattering of pickled walnuts. Whatever you opt for, The Boathouse's atmospheric interior and views across the water to the twinkling lights of Portsmouth should certainly make it a meal to remember.







ISLE OF WIGHT PILATES

If the sliding carriage of a Reformer Pilates machine is calling your name, then head up the stairs behind Smoking Lobster in Cowes, where you'll discover the new home of Isle of Wight Pilates. Opened in September 2023, this bright and lofty studio space, overlooking the yacht haven, is the first location on the Island offering tension-relieving Pilates classes that use the specially designed Reformer machine. This sliding piece of kit, with stretchy cords to attach to your arms or legs, is intended to make workouts more intense and dynamic and can also help you overcome injury too – as founder Emma Wharton found out.

Previously a professional dancer in the TV and musical theatre industry, a neck injury put a halt to her workout plans, until a friend recommended Reformer Pilates, which helped her safely build core strength and feel more confident to exercise again. Since then she's become a certified instructor, holding classes in Ibiza, Mallorca and Australia. Visitors to the Cowes studio can start off with entry-level sessions if they fancy, or if you're not quite ready to hop onto the machine just yet, mat-based sessions are also on offer.

CAROL MACARTNEY YOGA

Finally, for an eco-friendly escape with wellness top of the agenda, sign yourself up for a weekend retreat with senior yoga teacher Carol Macartney, taking place this March. A room with a view

The Isle of Wight is justifiably famous for its stunning coastline. Accommodation with a good view of the sea is always highly prized and often described as 'unique'. That can be an overused word, but as places to stay go, the Needles Lighthouse surely qualifies?

The Needles rock formation is the Isle of Wight's most famous landmark and marks the most westerly part of the chalk ridge that runs across the Island. The jagged white rocks soar up to 120m above the sea. It's made even more recognisable by the presence of a lighthouse right on its tip. It was built by Trinity House – the organisation that maintains all the lighthouses in England and Wales to this day – in 1858 to replace a lighthouse that had been built much higher on the clifftop around 80 years earlier. Whereas the old light was susceptible to being obscured by sea mists and fog, the new lighthouse was to be built at sea level. Its main function is to guide shipping into and out of the western approaches to the Solent. The lighthouse is 33m tall and is constructed of granite block walls that are a meter wide. Since becoming automated the lighthouse is monitored and controlled from Trinity House's Planning Centre



Early in 2023 Trinity House commissioned a full upgrade for the famous Needles lighthouse. This was to include new cables, a new fog hazard signal and the light itself being converted to LED. The work was to be undertaken over several months by crews of three men each calling the lighthouse their 'home from home' for two weeks at a time. Most of this work from March to August went largely unnoticed, until September 2023 when one of the crew, Nick Chappell, shared a few photos to a local Facebook page. They caused a minor sensation.




Nick captured some rare photos of daily life and some unique views.

Nick has worked for Trinty House for over 37 years and has visited the Island many times during his career. "I'd seen a Facebook page about the Island and thought I'd say hello. The response was so positive and almost overwhelming. At one point a video of mine had over 14,000 views and so many comments and questions that we couldn't keep up with replying." Islanders certainly took Nick and his fellow crew to their hearts, requesting more photographs and asking hundreds of questions about their work and daily life at the lighthouse. As a keen photographer, Nick was happy to oblige and provided many photographs and videos, with the Isle of Wight often providing a stunning backdrop. Over their two-week stay, the state of the weather and the supply of cake were updated almost daily, leading to some very funny messages.





Their Facebook fans were keen to know what it was like to stay at the famous lighthouse and were treated to some delightful glimpses 'behind the scenes'. Up until 1994 the lighthouse was permanently manned and operated by lighthouse keepers. Traditionally lighthouses have three keepers who were normally on duty for a month at a time, before going on leave for a month and being replaced by another crew of three.



Despite a number of wonderful suggestions from Facebook users as to what this delivery contains, they are, in fact, fresh water supplies which arrive in 400 litre bags.

The lighthouse is fitted with a cosy kitchen and sleeping accommodation for five persons at a time. Each of the bunks is curved in shape to fit the wall of the building. One of the most popular pictures shared by Nick was taken from the bedroom window. It looked directly back over the iconic chalk rocks that form the Needles.

Although the Needles lighthouse is no longer manned all the time, crew from Trinity House normally stay there at least twice a year. Every six months a crew will undertake what is called 'preventative maintenance', a full review of the facility and its equipment with a report of what might need repair or replacement. Six months later another crew will arrive for 'corrective maintenance', which is dealing with the issues previously identified. In between times the accommodation is checked and cleaned quarterly by an attendant based in Lymington so the lighthouse is always ready and prepared.

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

In 1987 a helipad was added to the top of the lighthouse to make it easier to deliver supplies, as well as getting personnel on and off. Like the headline acts for the Isle of Wight Festival in June, this is how Nick and his crew usually arrive on and leave the Island, In fact, Nick's job specifically involves the safe movement of equipment and supplies by helicopter. He is responsible for under-slinging the loads taken by helicopter. This included all the kit required to upgrade the lighthouse, along with other cargo. "I shared one photo of me on the helipad with several large bags. There were a lot of wonderful suggestions as to what they might contain, although no one guessed correctly. It was actually just our fresh water supplies which arrive in 400 litre bags."

Nick recalled one of the highlights of his last visit was watching the 'Waverley' pass by. This venerable paddlesteamer spends some time in the Solent every year and is always popular for day trips, especially out around the Needles. "I was working up on top wearing high-vis and waved at the crowd on the packed deck as it passed by the lighthouse. I was then amazed to be sent a photograph of me standing on top of the lighthouse by a passenger on the 'Waverley'. That made my day."

Now that it has been fully upgraded, the lighthouse can continue to do its vital job. Thanks to Nick and his colleagues Lee and Selwyn for their hard work and also for allowing us to share their time at the Needles.





Although the Needles Lighthouse is only available to Trinity House crew, you can enjoy a similarly spectacular view from the National Trust's cosy string of cottages on the clifftop grassland on the headland. Once home to the local band of coastguards, each light and airy cottage is named after a famous shipwreck and offers uninterrupted views of the sea, the sunset and the night sky. Alternatively, the three recently refurbished keepers' cottages located at the base of St. Catherine's Lighthouse allow you to bed down within sight and sound of the English Channel.

Located amongst the proudly independent shops of St James' Street, you'll discover a curated collection of over 850 games inside, from nostalgic classics like Scrabble and Monopoly to more modern (and niche) options such as Jungle Dominoes and Muffin Time. Feline fans won't be disappointed either, with a number of cat-themed games lining the shelves too – anyone for a round of Cat Lady or Cat Bingo?

Games aside, it wouldn't be a café without food and drink; and thankfully Snacks and Ladders offers a full restaurant menu as well as barista coffee, house cocktails and luxury milkshakes too. Choices on their most recent menu have included a melted cheese dipping board, spiced cauliflower bao buns and Isle of Wight beef burgers, served in a pretzel bun.

SHANKLIN THEATRE

Originally pencilled in for demolition in 2008, Shanklin Theatre is now a thriving community-run venue, with an impressive line-up of events, well worth sinking into their soft and cushiony seats for. Something of a local landmark, it was first built back in 1879 as the town's Literary Institute and is thankfully protected from any future wrecking balls by a recent Grade II listing. Supported by an army of 150 volunteers, the theatre has recently hosted events by comedians Phil Wang and Sarah Millican as well as talks by explorer Sir Ranulph Fiennes and cycling legend Sir Bradley Wiggins.

For those visiting this February, you're certainly spoilt for choice, with performances scheduled by the Ukrainian National Opera and Andrew Lloyd Webber's The Phantom of the Opera, plus there's an evening with star of stage and screen Sir David Suchet (best known for his TV role as Belgian detective Poirot). Before the curtain goes up, don't forget to stock up on sweets from the theatre's historic wooden box office and take a peek at the nearby Map Room, used as a local command and control centre during the Second World War.

WILDHEART ANIMAL SANCTUARY

Shifting northwards a tad, behind the sturdy Victorian walls of what was once Sandown Fort, you'll find the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary – home to some of the world's most threatened creatures. From wallabies and raccoons to marmosets and lynxes, there are certainly plenty of fur-covered friends to get to know, whilst daily reptile encounters, big cat talks and meerkat experiences will help you understand some of the threats and pressures facing these species in the wild.

On your tour around the sanctuary, don't miss the state-of-the-art Primate Rescue Centre too. Looking like a bamboo version of the Eden Project, the two giant domes, planted with trees, house the critically endangered ring-tailed lemurs – including Tsingy, who receives a birthday card each year from famous fan Dame Judy Dench. An ambitious construction, the domes are the first of their kind in Europe and the only bamboo home for any animal in Britain.

STRINGS BAR & VENUE

For music aficionados (and those looking to do something a bit different with their evenings) follow the faint sound of drumming to Strings Bar & Venue, in Newport's Bowling Green Lane. Founded by a group of musicians back in 2017, the 300-capacity venue has secured its place as the Island's premier live music location and has supported a whole host of up-and-coming local talent, such as Plastic Mermaids, Lauran Hibberd and the now legendary group Wet Leg.

If you're about in January, you could get yourself a ticket for Are You Experienced? – an authentic (and apparently explosive) Jimi Hendrix tribute act, now in their 25th year of performing. Meanwhile, in February, acts include rock band The Blockheads (whose former frontman was the late Ian Dury), Walsall-born blues musician John J. Presley and Plymouth-based folk rock and gypsy jazz band Mad Dog Mcrea.

THE GARLIC FARM

Finally, come rain or shine, you can't go wrong with a trip to The Garlic Farm. For over sixty years the Boswell family have been cultivating garlic in the village of Newchurch (ever since Granny Norah planted her very first cloves) and from February onwards, visitors can see the green shoots of the new year's crop, already starting to sprout.






The Boswell family have been growing garlic for over 60 years. The Garlic Farm shop offers a wide range of varieties as well as a diverse selection of products to enjoy at home.

Start off with a farm walk (wellies may well be needed) to see how their sustainable practices recently helped secure The Garlic Farm with B Corp status, before heading to the cosy restaurant where you can try their produce cooked up in dishes such as the watercress and roasted garlic gnocchi. There's also a well-stocked shop on standby, where you can test out black garlic beer or even garlic-infused ice cream.

Off grid getaways



If you like the idea of watching the sun rise over the fields through the triangular window of your cosy cabin bedroom, then book yourself into 'Kindred'. This two-storey wooden home comes with a handy ladder, leading you from the bedroom mezzanine down to the welcome cakes and locally sourced breakfast basket waiting in the living area below. Once you're ready to venture out into nature, find a route that'll take you deep into the depths of Parkhurst Forest (where royals once hunted and wild deer roamed free) before heading back for a quick dip in the on-site wood-fired hot tub.

LONGSTONE COTTAGE

Maybe you prefer your off-grid accommodation to be made from bricks and mortar, in which case, take a look at Longstone Cottage. Managed by the National Trust, this Edwardian gamekeeper's home is set halfway up Mottistone Down. Named after a rare Neolithic monument which sits nearby, this charming red-brick hideaway offers cosy interiors (lit by solar-powered lighting) and magnificent views across the rolling hills... just don't expect a dishwasher, TV or Wi-Fi.

Aside from visiting the impressive ancient Longstone (said to be 6,000 years old), guests can also hike over to Brighstone to take in the thatched stone cottages and sip froth-topped beers at The Three Bishops pub. Or, for those feeling a tad more adventurous, make your way down to Brook or Compton for a quick surf on the choppy winter waves of The Channel. Back at Longstone Cottage though, there's a log burner to warm you up again, as well as plenty of cushy armchairs to read in and throws to wrap around your shoulders as you stargaze from the windows.

SIBBECKS FARM

From late March onwards, you could also set satnav coordinates for Sibbecks Farm (or even use a map and compass if you're starting the digital detox en route). At this family-run glamping site, close to the ancient village of Whitwell, you can spend the night under canvas in one of their superior safari tents – whilst still enjoying the perks of hot water, electric blankets and a fully equipped kitchen.

Whether you plump for Meadow Escape (set in its very own acre of tufty grassland) or Stream Escape (sitting alongside a gently babbling brook) you can be sure of a revitalising back-to-nature escape, complete with visiting red squirrels and a resident barn owl. The site also has its own ducks and chickens too – the latter providing eggs for a fresh, zero-food-miles breakfast. Thrusting those wellies on and setting out to explore the local area, guests can discover the mini waterfall at Bierley, the 14th-century lighthouse on St. Catherine's Down and the distinctive village of Niton – home to an artisan pottery studio and just a touch of smuggling folklore.

CAMP WIGHT

If you feel like taking your off-grid experience to the max, then Camp Wight should be right up your street. Here, you can spend the night in a two-man hammock tent, strung between trees and raised above the ground. Set amongst historic West Wight woodland, with just composting toilets, solar showers and a fire pit as your facilities, it's certainly for the braver souls amongst us. That said, those looking for a cosier experience can opt for the nearby Geodesic Domes instead, with a log burner and USB charging points on standby.

Located amongst tranquil countryside on the Island's most southerly tip, with unbeatable views of Reeth Bay and the shimmering seas beyond, you'd be hard-pushed to find a better location for switching off and engaging in a spot of mindfulness or meditation. That said, once you've had your fill of peace and quiet, the vibrant town of Ventnor (with its unique shops and varied eateries) is just a clifftop trek away.

Ryde Pier provides new homes for marine creatures

Marine scientists from the University of Portsmouth have been swimming underneath Wightlink's historic Ryde Pier to fix new habitats to boost biodiversity on the 200-year-old structure.

The 'Biohuts' are large cages containing oyster shells and hessian rope. They will stay there for two years to encourage marine wildlife to move in. Similar projects elsewhere in the Solent have seen several species of fish and even endangered European eels in and around them.

Looking to the future

We're always looking at innovative ways to power our ships, ports and buildings – and our customers' vehicles, too. So, we invite you to take a peek into the future with some of the initiatives we're working on.

The installation of rooftop solar panels at our Gunwharf, Fishbourne and Lymington ports is well underway. The renewable energy generated will be used to power our port buildings and offices.

We are also trialling solar panels on our Wight Class ships between Lymington and Yarmouth. Wight Light is leading the way with this research. The data is extremely encouraging so far and, if successful, we'll be looking to roll out panels to all ships on that route.

With an increasing number of customers – and people living near our ports – switching to electric vehicles, we plan to increase the number of rapid charging hubs at Portsmouth, Fishbourne and Lymington.

We've also identified ways to improve our 'fuel husbandry' – meaning the procedures of caring for our fuel and its systems – to ensure our engines are getting the cleanest possible energy source. Fuel additives and advanced filtration will boost efficiency and decrease consumption of this resource, improving their environmental performance.

We've introduced food recycling on our Portsmouth to Fishbourne route, collecting waste food and coffee grounds from our cafés onboard and at our ports. Our contractors are using the food for anaerobic digestion – which generates renewable energy – and processing it into compost, which can be used for landscaping, agriculture and at garden centres.

We will be trialling solar panels on our Lymington to Yarmouth route.

Inspirational Islanders: Chani Kind, Regional Representative, Surfers Against Sewage

A keen swimmer and kayaker, Chani has been passionate about blue spaces from an early age. After studying for a degree in Marine Geography and a period working for the Environment Agency, she joined Surfers Against Sewage as their Regional Representative in 2022. Her role involves connecting with local communities and organisations on the Isle of Wight to provide a voice in campaigning for cleaner waters, protecting and enhancing our coastline for generations to come.

"I moved to the Island in 2014 to raise my family with access to the vast amount of variety of blue and green spaces here, which I feel are vital for our physical and mental health. People here are rightfully proud of their unique areas like Fishbourne, Gurnard and Bembridge and there is a real feeling of community.

My favourite Island place is the coastal path, whether taken in sections or completed as the main purpose of the holiday. It gives views and access to all of our stunning coastline.

I love spending time at Appley Beach. In summer at spring low tide you can walk out (though be aware the tide does come in quick, always put your safety first) to the far sand bars that make it seem like you're on a tropical island. Between the rivulets of sand, you can spot fish, crabs, seagrass and lugworms. In winter with a good pair of binoculars, you can witness (from a safe distance) a beautiful variety of seabirds too.

To choose just one Isle of Wight event as a favourite is so hard! What I love about the Island is it seems every weekend there are small-scale events from beach cleans to rockpool walks, guided fossil trails, cold water swimming groups and accessible surfing to get involved with. All are run by passionate people who want to share their love for our environment.



When arriving to the Island onboard our FastCat or our Portsmouth car ferry you will disembark on this side of the Island.

Just a few minutes from our Fishbourne port is Quarr Abbey, a working Benedictine Monastery. Explore the woodland walk around the abbey, visit the on-site chapel and stock up on local produce – much of the farm shop is stocked with items grown or produced by the Monks themselves.

Ryde is where you find our FastCat port and passengers will travel down the UK's oldest pleasure pier. Ryde Pier, originally built in 1814, has recently undergone an extensive renovation, including adding a separate walkway for pedestrians to safely walk along the pier.

The miles of sandy beach are dog friendly at this time of year and there are plenty of cafés and eateries to pop into and warm up on your bracing, wintery walk. "There was a Young Lady of Ryde,





Our prettiest ferry crossing lies in the west Wight, thanks partly to the drive through the New Forest and the journey along the Lymington estuary – which is complete with mudflats and salt marshes dotted with many species of water birds. Wightlink's ferry docks in the historic market town of Yarmouth. Carisbrooke, on the outskirts of Newport, is famed for its castle which was most notably the prison of King Charles during the Civil War.



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

"I was born and bred on the Isle of Wight so it's in my blood. I like to be near the sea, and listen out to the foghorns on a foggy night. Work-wise, I am lucky to spend a lot of time on the Island's rivers and streams, many of which are hidden gems.

The Isle of Wight has so many special places, it's really tricky to pick just one! The Blacksmiths between Carisbrooke and Calbourne has lovely food, great service and brilliant views over Parkhurst Forest and Newtown Estuary. Go at sunset.

My favourite beach on the Island is Ryde Sands. It's a Site of Special Scientific Interest and there is always something to see. When the tide goes out you can see for miles. I love it when the Sanderlings are visiting.

Shide Chalk Pit is my favourite place to go for a walk. It's just 5 minutes from the centre of Newport, but very peaceful.

Every October the Isle of Wight Literary Festival hosts a diverse range of writers and presenters. Covering everything from crime fiction, history, travel, gardening, medicine and technology, it's a real must-visit.

This is going to sound creepy, but if you only had an hour on the Island, I'd recommend a visit to Mount Joy Cemetery in Carisbrooke. It's super in summer – full of wildflowers and with spectacular views to Newport and the Medina Estuary."
