Carisbrooke Castle, sitting high and proud in the heart of the Isle of Wight, allows holidaymakers to walk in the footsteps of King Charles I, and climb its imposing walls to experience breathtaking panoramic views. You can also meet the castle's resident donkeys, who have been drawing up water in the well-house for hundreds of years. Demonstrations in the well-house take place throughout the day.



What will you find on the Easter Adventure Quest at Carisbrooke Castle?

Fancy feeling like royalty for a day? At Osborne you have the chance to take an intimate look into the life of Queen Victoria, who resided here for much of her life. Explore the labyrinth of sumptuous rooms of the grand house, and take a wander around the colourful flower-filled gardens, just like Her Majesty would all those years ago. There's plenty to keep the kids entertained here this spring too – take part in The Giant Brick Build Session, where children over the age of four can get creative by helping to build a LEGO® sculpture of Queen Victoria herself, guided by expert brick artists.

ANIMAL ADVENTURES

Looking to make furry or four-legged friends? You're in luck, as there are plenty of animal-themed attractions dotted around. One of these is the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary, located in Wroxall. Open seven days a week from 10:00, the sanctuary allows visitors to enjoy walks around the paddocks, pet the donkeys and tuck into a picnic on one of the numerous benches in their wildlife meadow. Entry is completely free, but donations are welcome to keep the donkeys healthy and happy.

You don't need to let bad weather stop you either. Amazon World is an all-weather all-season exotic animal haven for all ages. Walk through jungle rainforests with rare colourful birds flying overhead, and crocodiles quietly watching you from their pond. From here, you'll

encounter a variety of different rooms and enclosures, housing over 200 species, from Red Pandas to Ringtail Lemurs! There is also a large soft-play area for your own little monkeys to swing around in as you kick back with a coffee in Adventurers Cafe.





With it's Monkey Madness soft-play area and exotic animals, Amazon World is fun for all the family, whatever the weather – and is now a registered charity!

If you're a fan of big cats, the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary in Sandown should be at the top of your list. Here you can come face to face with Lions, Tigers, Servals and much more. If you're around for the Easter holiday, be sure to check out their Easter Madagascar Madness event which takes place from 29 March–14 April and promises to be 'egg-straordinary' fun for your little cubs!





Tracks through time

With the Isle of Wight Walking Festival celebrating its 25th year (and three of its co-ordinators nominated as Visit England tourism superstars) there's never been a better time to dust off those route maps and slip into those walking boots again. Plus, with over 500 miles of undulating paths across the Island, you won't be short of options either.

Founded in 1999, the Island's annual walking festival is said to be one of the biggest (and oldest) in the country. Since its first 5,000 attendees fished out their hiking sticks and set off on an initial programme of 39 walks all those years ago, the festival has evolved and expanded enormously, now including historic walking tours, accessible ambles and even hillside speed dating hikes.

Taking place at the same time is the annual Walk the Wight, which sees thousands of people trek from one side of the Island to the other, through ancient forests and over grassy downland, last year raising £460,000 for the Mountbatten hospice. So, with that, and the walking festival returning for its 25th year (from 11–19 May), we've decided to share a few of our favourite Isle of Wight routes, from gentle strolls to a few more strenuous options, to get you in the hiking spirit.



ALONG THE RIVER YAR

For the twitchers amongst us, this West Wight route is just the thing. Start outside the quaint Red Lion pub in Freshwater (famous for its parmesan doughnuts with whipped marmite butter), before heading down the twisting road, over the old stone bridge and turning left onto the wide gravelled path.



Pause for a while to enjoy the view of Yarmouth's historic Georgian tide mill.


Once the train line to Yarmouth, walkers along this tranquil stretch of track might be lucky enough to catch glimpses of herons, oystercatchers and even wigeons from between the rustling bulrushes (and to better your chances, bring some binoculars too). After 30 minutes, you'll reach the historic Georgian tide mill, where you can branch off for a look around Yarmouth town, veer east for a beverage at Off the Rails or continue following the river, before crossing the modern Yar Bridge and heading back to Freshwater on the opposite bank.

FRESHWATER BAY TO THE NEEDLES

If you're looking for something more strenuous (with some literary links too), then set coordinates for Freshwater Bay. After stocking up on provisions at the Orchard Brothers shop (a characterful village retailer, serving locals since 1865), head south towards the sea, passing the thatched church of St. Agnes. Continuing along Gate Lane, until you've almost reached the shoreline, signs will point you right, towards the steep grassy paths leading up Tennyson Down.

This chunky chalk hill takes its name from the famous Victorian poet Alfred, Lord Tennyson, who lived nearby at Farringford and often walked over these downs in his broad-brimmed black hat and cloak. Once you've caught your breath at the summit, alongside a granite cross to commemorate the great man, continue west amongst the gorse bushes and heather until you reach Alum Bay and the magnificent Needles rocks.

NEWPORT TO COWES

For a more family-friendly walk (or cycle), set off from the old brick warehouses down by the quay at Newport, heading past The Bargeman's Rest, round the corner and onto the cycle path. This three-and-a-half-mile route follows the woody western bank of the River Medina and offers optional stop-offs to see the 1860s timber-clad home of Newport Rowing Club, the medieval church at Northwood and the rows of young grapevines growing at the Pinkmead Estate.

Once you've reached the seaside town of Cowes, continue north through the streets of Victorian houses before ending at Northwood House – an elegant neoclassical home dating back to the early 1800s, surrounded by spacious parkland and volunteer-tended gardens.




If you're looking for somewhere to rest your weary feet and grab a bite to eat before heading uphill, The Spyglass Inn, perched at the end of Ventnor Esplanade is hard to beat!

VENTNOR COAST

If seaside saunters are more your bag, then take one of the stunning coastal routes around Ventnor. From the sparkling waters of The Esplanade, you could turn east towards the ancient village of Bonchurch (where Charles Dickens used to come and stay), however, we'd personally recommend a more westerly direction this time around. Begin by climbing the zig-zagging road behind the Spyglass Inn, turn left at the Royal Hotel and slip into the calm and tranquil Ventnor Park, complete with Swiss-style park keeper's lodge and (at the right time of year) ducklings too.







From here it's an easy downhill stroll to Steephill Cove, a characterful corner with rustic stone cottages and one of the most popular beaches on the Island. If you're not finished yet, continue to Ventnor Botanic Gardens or keep to the coastal path and you'll eventually end up in the former smuggling village of Niton.

SEAVIEW TO RYDE

Last on our list (although we'd love to share more) is the smooth and gentle route from Seaview into Ryde – a firm favourite with local dog walkers. Setting off from the centre of Seaview village, head down Bluett Avenue towards the charming row of red-tiled cottages in Salterns Road – some of which date back to the 16th century. Next, turning towards the coast, follow the sea wall to Puckpool Park and past the gun emplacements and fortifications of the old Victorian battery.

Once out the other side of the park, it's a gentle walk past Appley Tower (a 19th-century folly that looks like something Rapunzel might have lived in) before reaching the seaside town of Ryde. If all that walking has been thirsty work, then head up the hill and slip into No64 on Cross Street – an atmospheric café housed in a former pharmacy, where barista-made coffees and home-baked cakes await.




















Since 2022, this bright and lofty bolthole has been impressing guests and visitors with its plush velvet upholstery and sleek, elegant decor – so much so it took silver for the region at last year's 'Gems' awards, organised by Sykes Cottages. Described by the owner as a 'serene' spot to sleep, it also offers the perfect location for seaside swims and mindful walks amongst the lush, green shrubs of Ventnor Botanic Garden.

OLD ABBEY FARMHOUSE

Meanwhile, alongside the medieval ruins of Quarr Abbey, within sight and sound of a flock of bleating sheep, is Old Abbey Farmhouse. This sturdy stone cottage comes with plenty of rustic charm, a toasty log burner for those chillier nights and a private patio outside – to soak up the warming rays of spring sunshine. For those bringing a canine companion, you can rest assured there are plenty of lengthy walks through ancient woodlands right on your doorstep too – as well as more sticks for fetch than your pup will know what to do with.


Maybe, however, you fancy something a bit more deep and meaningful during your Isle of Wight sojourn, in which case, consider taking a room in the 'new' Quarr Abbey just up the road. Guests are invited to stay with the Benedictine monks in their Edwardian red-brick home, joining them for prayers, silent retreats and a thoroughly pared-back lifestyle.



THE MISSION

Moving south, you can't fail to miss the cheerful red and green paint of The Mission near Chale – a late Victorian chapel made from sheets of corrugated tin. Constructed in the 1890s (by a British family returning from Madras in India), its warm woody interiors and colourful midcentury design now welcome visitors looking for a tranquil countryside retreat on the Island's south coast.

With two bedrooms on the mezzanine and two others in the old Sunday School, The Mission comfortably sleeps up to eight people, with fun features including a sunken bath, a retro record player (with a plethora of vinyl) and a Japanese-style kamado barbecue outside in the garden. Although hard to leave all these things behind, a trip beyond the front door is well worth the effort, with surf-suitable beaches and an atmospheric country pub just moments away.

The Mission was built in 1897 to bring salvation to the smugglers and wreckers of the area and was run as an evangelical mission until 1991, before being converted in the 2010s.

CHAPEL HOUSE

Just around the corner, on the fringes of Chale Green, you'll find Chapel House – an impressive former church, bordered by green fields and thatched cottages. Set up for self-catering getaways in 2015 (after sitting empty for more than a decade), visitors will notice its lovingly restored original features, including stained glass windows and carved stone archways, as well as its elegant furniture and oh-so-sinkable beds.



The kitchen at Chapel House in Chale Green is elegant and modern – and has been fitted with every possible appliance you might need.

Located in a hamlet, surrounded by some of the Island's most impressive scenery, Chapel House is a particularly good option for those with countryside hikes high up on their agenda. Nearby paths and bridleways lead to the 19th-century Hoy Monument (built to commemorate the visit of a Russian tsar), as well as the ancient lighthouse on St. Catherine's Down and the magical mini waterfall at Bierley.

THE LIGHT CHAPEL

If you prefer your ecclesiastical escape to be a tad more urban, then swap the sticks for Station Road in Sandown, home to The Light Chapel. Once a Wesleyan church, designed by London-born architect William Wilmer Pocock (whose portfolio included chapels in Winchester, Hastings and Petersfield too) it has since been tastefully divided and converted – with the bright red door to the side (with its shiny lion-shaped doorknocker) marking the entry to The Light Chapel.

Here, up to four guests can bed down in lofty rooms, set amongst the beams – with sea glimpses on offer from the original criss-crossed lead windows. There's also a restful living area and sunny private garden, however, with the sandy beaches and lapping waves of The Channel just a short walk away, you probably won't be spending very much time here.

OLD CHURCH LODGE

Last but not least, visitors looking to locate themselves on the eastern side of the Island can't go wrong with Old Church Lodge in St Helens. This rustic stone cottage, owned by the National Trust, takes its name from the ruins of the ancient church of St Helena, most of which has been claimed by the waves over centuries past. Today, all that remains is the 13th-century tower, which was bricked up and made into a seamark for the navy in 1719.

Restful and homely, Old Church Lodge makes a great dog-friendly stay – and with no wifi on hand, it works well for any digital detoxing you may wish to do as well. Just behind the cottage sits the undulating turf of St. Helens Duver, an ecologically important area of sand dunes and grassland home to chiffchaffs, crickets and rare species of bees.

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Inspirational Islanders: Mike Christie Singer, member of G4 and Wight Proms founder

Singer and composer Mike began his professional career at the age of 8 as a chorister before appearing in the movie Four Weddings and a Funeral. In 2004, he auditioned as a member of vocal group G4 on the X Factor. The band celebrate their 20th anniversary this year with a new studio album out on 12 April, followed by an extensive UK tour – which includes the 5 June at Medina Theatre. In 2018 Mike launched Wight Proms, the annual outdoor proms festival in Cowes which celebrates comedy, musical theatre, opera and classical music, and includes free arts workshops.

Of course, I have to say the Wight Proms Festival is my favourite event! It's hard to believe we're celebrating our sixth year and I'm proud of how it's grown. We've got our series of Wight Proms Wednesdays returning too, where you can catch a performance and enjoy lunch afterwards. New this year, we will be taking the concerts to The Garlic Farm in the evenings, with tapas beforehand.

I also love Ventnor Fringe and can't wait to perform there on 21 July with Thomas as our singing duo 'Cameron & Christie'.

If I only had an hour to spend on the Island, I would go to Mountbatten Hospice to sing to the residents; something that means a lot to me. They do fantastic work supporting patients as well as their loved ones at the most difficult times."

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Dickens on the Island

As you gaze from your Wightlink ferry, did you know that you are travelling in the footsteps of Charles Dickens? 2024 marks the 175th anniversary of his last visit to the Isle of Wight and offers the perfect opportunity to uncover some hidden gems connected to his life and which inspired his works. We invite you to explore with Dickens' great-great-grandson and Island resident, Ian Charles Dickens.

he was born in Portsmouth on 7 February 1812. His father worked in the Royal Navy pay office and Charles' earliest



Victoria was a huge Dickens fan, writing excitedly in her diary about this new young author and when *Oliver Twist* was published, her Prime Minister warned her not to read it as he thought she would find it too shocking. She ignored him, finishing it on the eve of her wedding and declared the book "excessively interesting".




Founded in 1832, The Royal is one of the most historic hotels on the Island.


After their marriage, Queen Victoria and Prince Albert established Osborne House as their favoured summer residence which meant that the Island became THE place to holiday for Victorian society. That is likely part of the reason Dickens returned in 1849. He had begun work on David Copperfield and finding somewhere hidden away would allow him sanctuary to write. With the beaches and Downs nearby, he could then spend the afternoon doing all the typical family things that holidaymakers on the Island still do today. He was now a global superstar and wherever the writer went, he attracted attention from all quarters.




Osborne House put the Isle of Wight firmly on the map for Victorian tourists.

In July of that year, the Dickens family travelled on the newly built railway from London before taking a paddle steamer ferry from Portsmouth to Ryde. With him, his wife Catherine and their eight children, were copious amounts of luggage, as their visit was to last for three months. They had taken Winterbourne House in Bonchurch, which Charles fell instantly in love with – he wrote "I think it is the prettiest place I ever saw in my life, either at home or abroad".








To set himself up each day, Dickens would take a swim from the beach in Bonchurch, returning after writing to play rounders with his family.

David Copperfield is a novel that reflects much of Dickens' own life. He always said that it was his favourite, but because the early chapters reflected his tough childhood, it was hard to write about. To set himself up each morning, Dickens – then 37 years old – would take a swim from the beach in Bonchurch, before showering under an ice-cold waterfall that tumbled over the cliff. In 1849, Dickens had a carpenter route it in order to give him a perpetual shower bath. It still flows today in the garden of Waterfall Cottage. Then it was a walk up the steep slopes of St. Boniface Down to the Island's highest point before he was ready to pick up his quill. He declared to family and friends; "I have made it a rule that the inimitable is invisible until two every day".

When the writing was done, he was ready to spend time with family and friends and when the Dickens family took to the beach to play a game of rounders, the entire village was there to watch them.

The Dickens' made friends with the Reverend James White, a local property owner and daughters Mamie and Katie Dickens got on very well with the Reverend's daughters. Another family to strike up a friendship were the Dick family and two of the Dick children were to feature in two of Dickens' books.

A son – Charles Dick – was to become the inspiration for a character in *David Copperfield*. In Dickens' notes, this fictional eccentric was to be called Mr. Roberts but during his time on the Island, it was swiftly changed to 'Mr. Dick'. Charles Dick's sister Margaret was also friendly with the Dickens daughters and they were to meet again 11 years later.

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Inspirational Islanders: Ben Stubbs, singer-songwriter

Born and raised on the Isle of Wight, singer-songwriter Ben learnt to play the guitar at a young age, honing his singing skills at Medina High School. His original songs combine pop, rock and country and are heavily influenced by great songwriters like Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen and John Mayer. Ben's debut album was released in May 2023 and has attracted global attention from the music press. Along with his band, Ben regularly performs at venues and events across the South Coast and beyond.

"There's something really special about the Island. Something that encourages you to relax. A sense of calm you can't find in many places. As an artist, and a creative person, being able to relax and let your mind make stuff with little sense of urgency is a huge part of being able to create something that's honest and natural.

An incredibly supportive community is also such a big thing for anyone attempting to push their art out into the world and the Island community is wonderful. People just support each other and they actually care. Of course, having a feast of really excellent pubs, bars and restaurants hosting regular live music is a major benefit to someone in my job!

Choosing my favourite Isle of Wight place is tough, but it's got to be Ventnor Bay. It feels like you're somewhere in the Mediterranean on a warm summer evening. Who needs a summer holiday abroad when you have that?

We're pretty spoilt for choice when it comes to beaches, but Appley sticks out for me. A gorgeous, sprawling sandy beach, surrounded by trees and nature, in close proximity to some really great places to eat.

I used to love the walk from Ventnor through to Shanklin, through Devil's Chimney and the Landslip. We've lost a lot of that very recently but we're very fortunate to still have a lot of really amazing places to walk. Headon Warren out to the west is breathtaking. The views are incredible up there.

Little surprise here, but my favourite event has got to be the Isle of Wight Festival. We're very lucky to host some brilliant events here on the Island but for me, as a huge music fan, it has to be the Festival. It's such a great platform for our fantastic local music scene.

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What's on Wight

Get set for a busy summer! The Island's calendar is full to brimming with a whole host of exciting events – from music festivals and motorsports to comedy and country shows. So crack open that diary and get your pencilling-in hand ready, as we share our top tips for what not to miss over the coming months.

ISLAND CAR CENTRE SANDOWN SPRINT 20–21 APRIL

Hitting the road this April (with plenty of revving and shiny car mascots) is the Sandown Sprint – an exhilarating weekend of motoring action. Reviving the once popular speed trials and rallies held on the Island up until the late 1950s, this event sees the town's Parade turned into a temporary racetrack, with the lapping waves of the sea on one side and the chalk cliffs of Culver up ahead.



Last year, vehicles weaving their way through the straw-bale chicanes included a 1930s Austin, an MG from the 60s and a brand-new Ford Fiesta rally car. Later in the year, you'll also find the Isle of Wight Classic Motor Show taking place in Ryde and Newport – with up to 1,000 vintage, rare and classic cars parked up and ready to view.

VENTNOR BOTANIC GARDEN WELLBEING WEEKEND 18–19 MAY

If you're feeling that a little bit of relaxing and reviving is in order, then you won't want to skip the upcoming Wellbeing Weekend, held in the tranquil grounds of Ventnor Botanic Garden. Designed to help you connect (or reconnect) with your inner self, you can take part in everything from yoga and pilates to dance therapy, art therapy and even a spot of forest bathing. Plus, if you fancy taking the experience a step further you can even spend the night under canvas, camping amongst the lush greenery of the Botanic Garden.

Can't make the date? No problem – there's also a weekend wellness retreat hosted by Balance+Glo being held at East Afton Farmhouse in April, where you can experience daily energising yoga, strength-building fitness and optional sea dips too (weather dependent of course).





ROUND THE ISLAND RACE 15 JUNE

Prepare to don that lifejacket and hoist the mainsail on 15 June as the Round the Island Race returns. Put together by the Island Sailing Club, the race regularly attracts over 1,200 boats and 10,000 sailors – making it one of the largest yacht races in the world. After the brass cannons of the Royal Yacht Squadron are fired, competitors follow a fifty-nautical-mile course, starting from the waters off Cowes, racing westwards to The Needles, south to St Catherine's Point, rounding Bembridge Ledge and sweeping back into The Solent. Other notable nautical events in the schedule include Cowes Week (weighing anchor on the 27 July) and the Seaview Regatta (setting sail in August).

ISLE OF WIGHT FESTIVAL 20–23 JUNE

Ever since Jimi Hendrix played to a crowd of up to 600,000 people at Afton Down in 1970, the Island has been renowned for its legendary music festivals. Keeping this tradition going strong today is the annual Isle of Wight Festival (revived in 2002 and held at Seaclose Park near Newport), which returns for 2024 on the penultimate weekend in June.



As well as great music, the Isle of Wight Festival has plenty to keep the kids occupied too!

Headlining the event are The Prodigy, Pet Shop Boys and Green Day, whilst other acts stepping up to the mic will include Zara Larsson, Beverley Knight and The Darkness. If you're more of a classical music person though, you might prefer to make your way to Northwood House in mid-August where the operatic and orchestral Wight Proms will take place.







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Arguably the most famous event in the Island's calendar, the Isle of Wight Festival promises four days of fantastic music, arts and culture.

VENTNOR FRINGE 19–28 JULY

Described by the Independent as 'one hell of a homegrown festival', the Ventnor Fringe is the place to be for comedy, indie music and more artistic creativity than you can shake an easel at. Hosting over one hundred different shows, the event sees stages spring up across the town – from the black and white Magpie tent in Ventnor Park to the spacious Big Top on the scenic clifftop at Flowers Brook. Last year, events included comedy from London-based stand-up Sophie Duker, music from indie rock band Gengahr and an 'existential crisis on stage' by the Island's most well-known drag performer – Quivers. Other upcoming arts-based events on the Island include the ever-popular artists' Open Studios as well as the regular jazz and acoustic music evenings held at Newport's Quay Arts Centre.

ISLE OF WIGHT GARLIC FESTIVAL 17–18 AUGUST

For the foodies amongst us, a trip to the annual Garlic Festival (taking place just outside Newchurch) is definitely not one to be missed. Held annually since 1983, it celebrates one of the Isle of Wight's most famous (and most fragrant) exports – garlic – as well as bringing together local businesses, musicians and charities too.





Head to the Isle of Wight Garlic Festival and you'll discover a fragrant feast of garlicky goodness and a host of tasty treats to keep the whole family happy.

Taking centre stage will be the 'Theatre Kitchen', which in previous years has seen TV's Nadia Hussain demonstrating her baking magic, whilst local honey makers, drinks producers and fudge mixers will sell their tasty creations from rows of stalls nearby. If that's whetted your appetite for more foodie festivals, then you'll want to take a look at the Isle of Wight Steam Railway's Cider and Cheese Festival and the Great Wight Bite too – both coincidentally taking place on the 7–8 September.

Ryde Pier BioHuts: providing new habitats

Marine scientists from the University of Portsmouth have been swimming underneath our port on Ryde Pier to place new habitats on the historic 200-year-old structure.

The students fixed three 'BioHuts' to the metal piles. The large cages, containing oyster shells and hessian rope, will remain there for two years and will be monitored for signs of marine life inside. Similar projects elsewhere in the Solent have seen several species of fish and even endangered European eels swimming in and around the BioHuts.

Seagrass beds, salt marshes and kelp forests play an invaluable role in the Solent environment. The team have been carrying out assessments of the rich seagrass meadows under the Pier too.

By providing new habitats we will increase biodiversity, encouraging juvenile fish and cuttlefish to set up home inside them so populations can increase. We expect the cages to quickly become colonised by marine flora, with marine creatures likely to follow.

The research will provide the University with information on the health and productivity of these ecosystems, along with initiating conservation and rewilding efforts, that will improve the biodiversity associated with these ecosystems across the Solent.

Wightlink is committed to looking after the environment we sail through every day, and we are pleased to support University of Portsmouth marine scientists with their research projects.

Future Fuels - finding cleaner and more sustainable sources

When we use fossil fuels like oil and gas for energy, they produce carbon dioxide, a major contributor to climate change. Our industry is working together to find cleaner and more sustainable energy sources.

But what are the fuels of the future? Could ferries sailing the Solent in years to come use 100% electric power? Innovative fuels like ammonia and methanol? Or green replacements for diesel such as biofuel?

Different shipping companies and routes will require different types of fuels and Wightlink is proud to be leading the way with Victoria of Wight – England's first hybrid electric ferry, that uses powerful batteries as well as conventional engines.

We recently organised a conference on the Island at Fishbourne, bringing together representatives from the UK Government's Department for Transport, shipping companies and regional maritime businesses

The aim was to address important challenges facing our industry. Maritime UK Solent invited leaders from various sectors to discuss the move from traditional fuels to more environmentally friendly options, with the goal of achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Achieving net zero means reducing emissions as much as possible from things like fossil fuels and offsetting any remaining emissions through natural processes like ocean and forest absorption or by using carbon capture technologies.

Decarbonisation – how we'll reach net zero – is a shared challenge for everyone in our industry, but fortunately the Solent maritime community has a wealth of expertise to draw upon. The discussion covered a range of topics, including technological hurdles, investment in infrastructure, and training for maritime professionals to adapt to these new fuel sources.

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

North

The north of the Island is home to possibly the best-known town on the Isle of Wight, Cowes. Long associated with sailing and all things nautical, Cowes is a hive of activity during the summer months...

From the sailing competitions including the Round the Island Race and Cowes Week, to the dry land entertainment, there are a multitude of events taking place. Many of the pubs that line the High Street have live music playing and there are street entertainers – it's a real party atmosphere. A summer stroll from Cowes to the neighbouring village of Gurnard is a must, with perfect

vantage points lining this flat and even walk. Upon arrival, you will find Gurnard to be a pretty little village with a couple of pubs, a post office-come-coffee shop and a peppering of beach huts lining the esplanade.

Across the River Medina is East Cowes. Once the holiday destination of Queen Victoria and her family, a trip to the Island would not be complete without a tour around her palatial holiday home, Osborne. It was built between 1845 and 1851 in a quintessential Italian Renaissance palazzo style, with its sweeping terraces, towers and stunning formal gardens leading down to a beautiful beach, only accessible through the grounds.

Best beach for sunsets: GURNARD


Gurnard is a great place to catch a sunset as it lights up the sky over the Solent.

Inspirational Islanders: Claydon Connor Co-founder, Strings Bar & Venue

Opened in 2017, Strings Bar & Venue is a 300-capacity live music and performing arts venue situated in Newport. Having collectively realised there wasn't a dedicated live venue on the Isle of Wight for musicians, co-founders Claydon Connor and Ian Davison established Strings. The venue is now pivotal to the Isle of Wight music scene, helping emerging local artists such as Wet Leg, Lauran Hibberd and Beth Brookfield showcase their talents as well as hosting a wide variety of bands, DJs and comedians.

"I'm originally from Manchester, but moved here when I was quite young. We used to holiday here as kids and loved the idea of living by the sea. The Isle of Wight offered a good opportunity to create something special in a unique part of the country. The slightly slower pace and fresh sea air certainly add to the appeal too.

We have some stunning landscapes, but I've always liked Newtown Creek and that northwest part of the Island. It changes through the seasons, but there's always something different to see.

When the weather is good, I like to head to the beach and, although it's a shingle beach, I actually really like Woodside Bay in Wootton. With trees along the edge, it's a little off the beaten track and has great views over the Solent.

There's certainly no shortage of places to go for a walk on the Isle of Wight. The narrow streets in Yarmouth always have a nice buzz about them, but within minutes you can be alongside the estuary on the Causeway. If I want to get out in the open air, I head to Mottistone Down.

Picking my favourite event is hard, as to be honest... my life is one show after another, so I don't get to go to many others on the Island. We've got some great performers coming up in the next few months at Strings, including Tankus the Henge, The Bluetones and China Crisis. Goldie Lookin Chain and Vote Pedro should be good fun too.

If I only had an hour on the Island, I'd head to Newtown Creek to take a wander along the boardwalk and see what I could spot. It's a real haven for wildlife."

North East



The north east has everything going for it. From the miles of golden sands that hug the coastline, to the wildlife-rich limestone ledges off St Helens Duver and the hustle and bustle of the Island's largest town, Ryde...

Here you will find miles of perfect sandy beaches coupled with excellent entertainment. Stripey beach huts sit alongside coastal cafés and restaurants, whilst traditional funfairs, trampolines, a bowling alley and a boating lake provide hours of entertainment for all the family. The town itself is built up a hill that provides wonderful views when looking back down towards the Solent and the pre-Victorian pier. You will find a good range of boutique shops for that one-off treasure, as well as plenty of places to relax with a drink and a bite to eat.

Venturing out of Ryde you will undoubtedly stumble across Seaview. The picturesque Edwardian coastal town has a nostalgic charm, with regattas galore during the summer months and the sea is busy with Mermaid boats and kitesurfers. The beaches here are slightly quieter and have a distinctly desert island feel.


Round the corner, before you hit the most easterly tip of the Island you will pass through the village of St Helens, known for its large village green that forms the centre. On the outskirts towards Brading, Oasis is well worth a visit. Family owned and run, this shop is a veritable treasure trove, packed with interesting and unique items for the home – many hand-picked in Bali. They also have a coffee shop where the cakes are worth the visit alone!

The small parish of Fishbourne could be mistaken for not much more than a place to get on and off the Island at Wightlink's ferry port, but you would be missing a trick. It is the ideal place to start a walk to neighbouring Quarr Abbey along a well-trodden path. Quarr Abbey was built next to the ruins of the original abbey in 1911. There are beautiful grounds to explore, where you will find pigs to feed and watch as they revel in the mud. The Tea and Farm Shop does a superb ploughman's and stocks the Abbey's own produce, including the refreshing Quarr Abbey Ale.

Further inland, you can step into a perfectly preserved piece of history. The Isle of Wight Steam Railway provides a brilliant family day out. Take the steam train along the line from Wootton to Smallbrook Junction. Alight at Havenstreet for a trip around the award-winning Train Story Discovery Centre, watch engines being renovated or stretch your legs and venture through the Woodland Walk.




Best beach for sandcastles: **APPLEY**

The southern point of the Island has its own distinct feel, due to the unique microclimate and the artistic heritage that is still in full swing today...

Ventnor is a real mini-Mediterranean town, bustling with pavement cafés, where people sit and take in the views of the English Channel. The town has a distinct artisan vibe, as zigzag roads with Victorian terraces lead down to one-off shops including art galleries, vintage and antique emporiums and jewellers. There are plenty of independent eateries that use local produce. Being close to the sea, seafood is, of course, a local speciality. Watch the fishermen sail in on their boats and then pick up the day's catch at the shop on the harbour. Try one of the pubs and restaurants that will be offering fresh fish as the daily special, such as The Spyglass Inn that sits atop the sea wall

The unique climate of the south is perhaps best experienced with a trip to Ventnor Botanic Garden, where you will find an unrivalled selection of subtropical and exotic plants and flowers set in 22 acres. From the garden, take a walk down to Steephill Cove where after the (many) steps, you will be rewarded with a picturesque cove and a smattering of eateries serving up the speciality of locally-caught crab.

A visit over this side provides the perfect excuse for a trip to the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary where everyone is welcome, including well-behaved dogs. Rugged beaches, steep cliffs and beautiful walks, the south coast has it all and it's no wonder it has inspired a few famous names over the years, including Charles Dickens who wrote several chapters of David Copperfield here.

VENTNOR

Most of the south coast feels decidedly Mediterranean thanks to its unique microclimate and sub-tropical plant species. Ventnor beach, backdropped by pavement cafés, cliff-top houses and winding roads can make you think you have taken the boat to the Amalfi Coast by accident!



Best beach for dogs: STEEPHILL COVE

Dogs are permitted on the beach here on a lead during the day and then given free rein after 18:00. Steephill Cove is a true hidden gem and could easily be mistaken for a tropical island. Only accessible by foot, making it ideal for beachgoers with dogs as your four-legged friends get a good walk there and back.

Best beach to have to yourself: BINNEL BAY

Its relative inaccessibility means that if you make the trip to Binnel Bay, you are usually rewarded by having this rugged and unspoilt beach to yourself. You will not find any facilities here so best to pack a picnic and you certainly need to be able to walk and climb over some of the larger rocks to get there.

Best beach for swimming: FRESHWATER BAY



At the heart of the Island you will find several quaint villages, as well as the Island's capital town, Newport. Here you will enjoy a mixture of High Street names and some excellent independent boutiques for both fashion and homewares...

The town centres around two main squares then stretches down to the historic quay where you will find an art gallery and café. The Bargeman's Rest pub sits on the water's edge and is an ideal spot to relax.

For local heritage, Carisbrooke Castle is hard to beat. The history of the castle can be traced back to about AD 1000. Raided by both the Spanish and French, the castle's most famous inhabitant was King Charles I, who was imprisoned here during the Civil War between 1647-1648, before being executed in 1649.

Take a drive through Arreton and be sure to stop off at Arreton Barns, the Island's largest centre for arts and crafts. Here you will find traditional crafters mixed with contemporary artisans. There is also a pub serving real ales and home-cooked food, a farm shop packed to the


rafters with local produce and The Corn Exchange – a beautiful interiors and giftware store.

Portsmouth

In the year that the Isle of Wight celebrates 175 years since Charles Dickens enjoyed a working holiday in "quite the prettiest place" he had ever seen, why not also hop across the Solent to visit the home in which he was born?

A terraced house, on what is now Portsmouth's Old Commercial Road, witnessed Dickens' birth and is today a museum dedicated to the great author.

Open on set days throughout the year, the Charles Dickens Birthplace Museum is decorated in the Regency style and contains many of the author's personal possessions.

The big anniversaries continue, with 2024 marking 80 years since the D-Day campaign of World War 2. Thousands of troops set off from Portsmouth on the operation to liberate France, and many of their testimonies are recounted at The D-Day Story museum on Southsea seafront. It's where you'll also find LCT 7074, the enormous Landing Craft that carried up to 10 tanks and their crew members across the channel.

A host of events are planned for the days around the anniversary on 6 June, in addition to a whole year of activities being organised by The D-Day Story itself.

The events continue apace across Portsmouth these coming months, with something in the calendar for all tastes and budgets. Takedown Festival returns, bringing the best in rock and metal to Portsmouth Guildhall over two days and a great many stages. The Guildhall is also playing host to its annual Comic Con in May, as well as 'Fiests', calebrating the food and music of Mayico.
