

Investing in our ships

The annual maintenance programme for our eight-strong fleet is set to wrap up by Easter.

We're proud to have kept much of the planned works close to home, with Wight Sky and Wight Light visiting Hythe Shipyard, Wight Ryder I and Wight Ryder II dry docking in Portchester, St Faith and St Clare are undergoing refits in Southampton with a brief visit to Falmouth for docking and hull inspections. Victoria of Wight is seeing Southampton and Portsmouth and taking a short trip to Portland for an in water-survey. The annual refit, which can include dry docking, is vital to ensure we stay shipshape and ready to transport around 4 million of you every year.

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Arts, crafts and quality time

New skills to learn on the Island this winter

Whether it's sat behind a potter's wheel or perched amongst the canvases in an artist's studio, the Isle of Wight's winter workshops offer the perfect way to learn new skills – as well as providing some pretty unforgettable memories too. So roll up those sleeves and tie those apron strings as we give you a quick tour of the options.

ARTS, CRAFTS AND QUALITY TIME

THE JEWELLERY CABIN

If a few relaxing hours tapping away with a hammer, bending solid silver with pliers and creating unique items of jewellery sounds like your cup of tea, then book yourself a slot at the Jewellery Cabin. Set amongst the green fields between Gatcombe and Chillerton, this rural retreat offers a range of sessions, from private birthday and hen do parties, to bangle-making evening classes and sea glass ring workshops. Ready and waiting to instruct are co-founders Kelly and Jodie (both silversmithing graduates) alongside experienced jewellery makers Suzy and Becca. With a room (or should that be studio) full of experience, all the tools you could need, and an ample supply of drinks and sweet treats, the stage is set for a fascinating few hours of making.





WIGHT APOTHECARY

Perhaps you prefer your workshops to come with an array of enticing aromas and a dose of rejuvenation, in which case, the classes on offer from Wight Apothecary could be just the thing. Run by former photographer Tracey Simmonds-Bland (also known as Mrs B), they mix craft, sustainability and well-being into one – with workshop options including reed diffuser making, dried flower wreath weaving and aromatherapy candle mixing. For a shorter spell of crafting, consider the bath salt workshop, where attendees learn the fundamentals of blending essential oils and base oils, before creating their own stress-relieving mix of ethically sourced salts.

ISLE OF WIGHT POTTERY

If the smell of fresh clay and the soothing rotations of the potter's wheel are more up your street, then head to the historic village of Niton. Here you'll find Isle of Wight Pottery, where Scarlett and Sara are on hand to provide fun and friendly sessions for amateur potters, both young and old. Perfect for fans of *The Great Pottery Throw Down*, classes can introduce you to sculpting, handbuilding or wheel throwing, plus everything you make gets fired and taken home. If an hour and a half is just not long enough, enrol yourself on the weekend course, where master potter Neil Tregear (who originally learned his stoneware skills in Kyoto, Japan) will teach you how to make everything from mugs and bowls to vases and jugs.

JULIE SAJOUS ART CLASSES

Over in Wellow, in a converted caravan set amongst her lush green garden, you'll find the sunny studio of West Wight artist Julie Sajous. Hosting small classes, with tea and cake at the ready, she covers everything from collage and printmaking to acrylic painting and watercolour. In-person lessons offer a warm and supportive environment, where even the most self-conscious of sketchers will lose the fear and regain their artistic confidence.



Can't make it along to an in-person workshop? Try one of Julie's video sessions which take place in a diverse array of locations including The Needles, London and Portugal.

If lessons clash with something already pencilled into your diary, fear not, as you can always take part in Julie's online virtual sketch walks. These engaging video-based sessions will sharpen up your landscape and architectural drawing skills while taking in an array of attractive locations such as the Needles, London's Southbank and Olhão in Portugal.



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

CORALESCE STAINED GLASS

Maybe you're looking to channel your inner artisan and get to grips with a critically endangered craft, then try out one of the illuminating courses on offer from Coralesce Stained Glass. From his airy Victorian barn in Brighstone, master craftsman Colin Conroy shares his skills and experience accumulated over forty years of making, repairing and rebuilding stained glass panels across Essex, Surrey and the Isle of Wight.

Ease yourself in gently with the two-and-a-half-hour taster course, which introduces the history, materials and tools of the trade – before helping you create your own four-panel stained glass light catcher. For something more in-depth, the five-week courses await. Whether you plump for beginner, intermediate or advanced, these inspiring sessions will have you well on your way to becoming a stained-glass maker. Alternatively, the stained glass workshops allow visitors to create small ornaments or decorative panels within a one-day session.

ISLAND CRAFTWORKS

And finally, behind the unassuming shopfront of 130 High Street, Ryde, is Island CraftWorks, a creative and uplifting space for hands-on arts and crafts. Especially popular with younger visitors, these affordable sessions are perfect for entry-level crafters looking to get stuck in and make something new.

At the helm is Gabby, whose passion for arts and crafts began as she grew up in the New York borough of Brooklyn. These days, she specialises in Boho-inspired crafts, incorporating natural elements into home décor, gifts and attractive decorations. Amongst the constantly evolving repertoire of classes, recent options have included paper flower crafting, macramé weaving and Native American dream catcher making, as well as seashell wreaths and wind chimes. You can also book a birthday party or date night session, or sign up for the seasonally-themed half-term and holiday classes.







There's so much varied countryside and coast to choose from that you'll be spoiled for choice: if it's fields and forests you're after to meander through, rugged chalk downs or the miles of coastal paths that take you to dramatic cliff tops, rocky coves and estuaries, then the Isle of Wight is the perfect walker's paradise.



GET YOUR WELLIES ON AND GET WALKING

FOR LITTLE LEGS

The revetment running from Sandown to Shanklin along the beach is the perfect flat walk for kids and can also be walked as a circular route by returning along the upper cliff path. It's a great route for beachcombing on the way at low tide or avoiding the splashing waves at high tide for amazing views across the Bay. Begin at the pier in Sandown and once you get to the end at Small Hope Bay turn right up the hill and join the cliff path, stopping at Blueberry's Café en route for some of the best cake on the Island. It may be blustery up there, so it is an ideal time for those granny-knitted Christmas scarves.



Make a stop at Blueberry's Café en route for cake – you won't be disappointed!

FOR SQUIRREL SPOTTERS

The Isle of Wight is renowned for being the only place in the UK with a solely red squirrel population and the Red Squirrel Trail celebrates not just these furry mammals but a wide variety of other birds and wildlife. The 32-mile trail is a popular cycle route, but you can also walk the trail in sections, and the path from Shide to Newchurch is brilliant for kids who may want to scoot or cycle alongside you. It follows the route of a disused railway line which skirts farmland before reaching Merstone, where the former station consisting of a single island platform still stands. Following the signposted route takes you across the Yar's floodplain until Langbridge, at the edge of Newchurch to Pedallers Café where you can enjoy a much-earned cuppa or a glass of wine if that takes your fancy.

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FOR A TOUCH OF HISTORY

With the new abbey being built in 1907 for the French Benedictine monks of Solesmes exiled on the Island, Quarr Abbey is now home to a small group of Benedictine monks, and the walks around the grounds are tranquil, peaceful and a balm for the soul.



Situated in the tranquil grounds, the Quarr Abbey Tea Room is a great spot for a cuppa!

Start at the Abbey car park and cross into the grounds, visiting the pigs on the way. Head through the Abbey gates to find the Woodland Walk, which leads to Quarr Road and another woodland area. Then follow the trail toward the sea, keeping an eye out for mistletoe in the trees above your head. Near the Abbey Ruins, explore the arches and the oak tree growing through them, and then stop by the Tea Room where you can buy local produce and all-important pig food to feed your porcine pals on the way out. Built in 1875, picturesque Appley Tower is straight out of a fairytale.

FOR TEA BESIDE THE SEA

Running from Appley in Ryde through to Seagrove Bay, just beyond Seaview you can follow the 'Garden Walk', which leads along the sea wall and is a flat walk ideal for pushchairs or those who are less able. You'll pass by some little pockets of history with a Victorian fortification battery and Puckpool Park with Puckpool House, a Swiss-style cottage orné built in 1822. When you reach Seaview, if the tide is low you can continue to Seagrove Bay and marvel at some of the Island's most exclusive seaside properties before returning along the beach for tea with a view at the Dell Café back at Appley.

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FOR TWITCHERS

The Causeway which runs from Yarmouth through to Freshwater on what was part of the old railway line is a mecca for birds that live and breed in the nature reserve and waters on either side of the route. Begin by the side of the old mill house in Yarmouth and continue down the path until you reach Church Place across the bridge. You can either retrace your steps or carry on with the trail which takes you through farmland (make sure you're wearing wellies!) and finishes on the opposite side of the bridge in Yarmouth to the one you started from. From there, treat yourself to some lunch at the converted railway station café and restaurant Off the Rails.



FOR SERIOUS STOMPERS

For a real challenge take yourself along the Tennyson Trail from Newport to Alum Bay via Brighstone, Freshwater and Tennyson Down. Begin your walk at Carisbrooke Castle where Charles I was imprisoned, then head through the beautiful Brighstone Down and Brighstone Forest before arriving at the coast with splendid views towards Alum Bay and the Needles from Freshwater Bay golf course. Walk down into Freshwater breaking your journey to fortify yourself at the Piano Café or Dimbola Tea Room at Dimbola Museum & Galleries before climbing Tennyson Down towards the monument and into Alum Bay. The walk is 23 km so make sure you've got your stomping legs on and it'll be a bus ride back to Newport.

In 2024 he achieved a lifelong dream of representing Great Britain at the Paris Olympics.

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The hidden history of Chale

Often overlooked, the compact village of Chale, located on the Island's southwest coastline, might seem quiet and unassuming. However, if you know where to look you'll soon find a long and intriguing history, giving you more reasons to visit than you might first think.

THE HIDDEN HISTORY OF CHALE

THE CLARENDON

Of all the places to begin, you can't go wrong with a snug settle tucked away in a corner of the Wight Mouse Inn, formerly known as The Clarendon. As you sip your freshly pulled pint, you might wonder where its previous name came from, and the answer could quite literally be in the beams above you.

Back in 1836, a merchant ship of the same name went aground in Chale Bay during a heavy storm, carrying rum, sugar, molasses and coconuts from the Caribbean. A local fisherman, named John Wheeler, managed to save three lives from the ship but soon the waves had broken the boat apart and the remaining passengers and crew were lost.

As its timbers washed up in the days that followed, some were picked up by the villagers and used to build part of what is now the Wight Mouse Inn. Meanwhile, local outrage at the tragedy led to the construction of St. Catherine's Lighthouse, just down the road in Niton, which has undoubtedly saved many lives since.

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Amongst the attractions at Blackgang Chine was a skeleton of a whale, from where you could buy fossils, ceramics and coloured sand.

BLACKGANG CHINE

Moving southwest, you can't fail to miss Blackgang Chine – especially the towering fibreglass figure of a smuggler which marks the entrance. Supposedly the UK's oldest amusement park, it can trace its history all the way back to 1843 when Alexander Dabell (great, great grandfather of the current owner Alec) chose the rustic hamlet of Blackgang to host his park of curiosities.

Amongst its attractions was the entire skeleton of a whale which had washed ashore on a beach near the Needles – soon becoming the centrepiece of the park's bazaar. From inside its ribcage, you could buy fossils, ceramics and bottles of coloured sand collected from Alum Bay. In 1853, Queen Victoria dropped by to see the infamous Blackgang whale, helping to cement the park's reputation as a mustvisit Isle of Wight destination for years to come.

ST CATHERINE'S ORATORY

Heading further uphill and through a kissing gate, you come to St. Catherine's Down, one of the highest (and most blustery) points on the Island. At the top, perched overlooking the green fields and bright blue waves of the Channel, is a medieval octagonal tower, affectionately known to Islanders as 'The Pepperpot'. This sturdy stone structure is all that survives of an oratory (or chapel) built in 1328 by local landowner Walter de Godeton.



St Catherine's Oratory was built in 1328 and is thought to have been used as a lighthouse.

Fourteen years earlier, a ship sailing for a monastery in the French region of Picardy was wrecked nearby and Walter helped himself to its cargo of white wine. Having plundered church property, he was threatened with excommunication and ordered to build the oratory as penance, including a lighthouse – the tower of which you can still look inside today.

THE MISSION

Following the twisting turns of Blythe Shute back down into the village, you can't fail to miss the cheerful red and green paintwork of The Mission – a late Victorian chapel made from sheets of corrugated tin. Back in 1873, Charles Reade, a civil servant based in Madras, India, returned to the UK and settled with his family on the Isle of Wight's southern shore. A religious family, they hoped to support the local community by building a small church hall (which has since fallen into the sea) but as their following grew, a bigger and better one was in order.

Dating from 1897, The Mission operated as a church all the way up until 1991 but now serves as stylish holiday accommodation, complete with warm woody interiors and colourful mid-century décor. The double-height hall now hosts a relaxing living area and 1950s-style kitchen, whilst the old Sunday school has been converted into some bright and airy bedrooms.

With it's distinctive red and green colour scheme, The Mission is a local landmark.

CHALE ABBEY STUDIOS

Next, you could take a scenic coastal drive along the rugged Military Road and pass the vast agricultural fields, once tended to by Czechoslovakian refugees during the Second World War. Alternatively, if you happen to have a debut single to record, you might want to turn inland and make Chale Abbey your destination.



Chale Abbey is rumoured to be one of the oldest domestic structures on the Island and now houses a well-equipped recording studio, packed with ecclesiastical charm.

Originally constructed in the 14th century for the Constable of Carisbrooke Castle, the listed stone building is supposedly one of the oldest domestic structures on the Isle of Wight (though it was interestingly never actually an abbey). Today a private home, its 16th-century barn has been restored, revamped and converted into one of the best-equipped recording spaces on the British south coast. Nestled on the undulating slopes of the downs, Chale Abbey Studios is now making history of its own and has already been involved in the recording of Michael Kiwanuka's number one album Love & Hate, as well as the Grammy-nominated album Islander by Norwegian singer-songwriter Bernhoft.

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Inspirational Islanders: Nigel and Boe Howell

Every year Wightlink sponsor a number of athletes and sports teams with discounted travel, amongst which are some notable family connections. We caught up with father and daughter Nigel and Boe Howell to discover their favourite Island places.

Nigel has competed all over the world in watersports including on the PWA Windsurfing World Tour for many years becoming National Champion, World Cup event champion, and also the Kitesurfing National Champion. For many years he ran the famous White Air Extreme Sports Festival – an amazing event featuring multiple adventure and extreme sports both on and off the water. Nigel can now often be seen at surfing events alongside his daughter Boe who is part of the Surfing England team.

Now 17 years old, Boe has been surfing since she was six and has travelled to some of the world's top surfing venues to train and compete. She is a member of the Surfing England Team and in December 2023 travelled to Rio to compete in the World Junior Surfing Championships. Boe lives on the Island but trains wherever the waves are best, training with the England Team in Cornwall, Devon and abroad.

NIGEL HOWELL, WINDSURFER

"The options that the Isle of Wight offers for water sports, with lots of beaches and harbours within easy reach of each other, make it the ideal place to live. Being an Island, you can find the wind and surf conditions that you want simply by driving a few miles, rather than long-distance drives required on the mainland. There are perhaps fewer work opportunities than in more urban areas, but the lifestyle and outdoor sports access are really why we live here.

Between surfing with my daughter Boe, who competes for England, the various wind-based water sports and other activities we do as a family (my wife Sarah competes in the Premier Pickleball League and has recently been crowned National Champion 2024 in the mixed doubles) we are always involved in something that requires ferry travel! We travel a lot, but wherever you live it will be the same... the difference being that the Isle of Wight is an amazing place to return to after each trip. Nothing changes and everything seems to stand still... it's like going back in time!

My favourite beaches are the west side surf beaches as they offer better conditions for wind sports and surfing. Most of my time is spent along the west and south coast between Freshwater Bay and Niton.



It's hard to beat a walk up over Tennyson Down to the monument. It's got stunning views overlooking the west coast, Freshwater Bay, Yarmouth and The Needles, all the way over to the mainland. A really impressive sight on a clear day.

The Isle of Wight is blessed with lots of beautiful places, but my home town of Yarmouth is my favourite. It's such a beautiful harbour town, close to the surf beaches, quick access to the mainland, and gets the long evenings with the sunsets.

Sponsorship from Wightlink makes a huge difference to us. It simply wouldn't be possible to take the sports to other levels without it. All the training, the Surfing England Team events; and all the other events are on the mainland, so I am constantly travelling. Getting to mainland events when you live on an Island and have to get the ferry isn't easy, but without the sponsorship it simply couldn't happen."

BOE HOWELL, SURFER

"The Isle of Wight is one of the most unique places in England as it's an island, it's super pretty all year round with really nice beaches on every side of it, and overall just a great place to live.

All the Island's beaches are really nice, but my favourite is probably Freshwater Bay as it gets great surf and has an insane water colour and really cool cliffs.

I agree with Dad. I'd definitely recommend a walk over the downs because of the insane views!

I like Ventnor and Yarmouth as they're really pretty towns, but other than that, pretty much just any of the beaches in the West Wight, like Freshwater Bay.
