#### THE GARLIC FARM

One for the foodies and garlic lovers! Nestled next to the historic village of Newchurch you'll find The Garlic Farm, where their seven luxury yurts and five tastefully converted cottages offer a relaxed countryside getaway. Explore stunning, organic farmland right on your doorstep, with beautiful woodland, peaceful lakes, and pasture-raised cows and goats grazing in the surrounding fields. # Blooming marvellous

Late spring and early summer are when the Island is at its most beautiful. Bare boughs sprout green shoots, bulbs burst from the soil, and gardens awaken. Take some time to explore some of the many gardens open to the public or wander through woodland to reconnect with nature and the new season.

#### GARDENS WITH HISTORY

Queen Victoria's favourite retreat, Osborne, is a mustvisit for its beautiful formal gardens, colourful terraces and sweeping views over the Solent. The walled garden, originally used to grow fruit and vegetables for the royal household, is now a beautifully restored space showcasing seasonal flower, fruit and vegetable planting. The terraces lead to the private beach, and visitors can also explore the extensive woodland walks that stretch down to the Swiss Cottage, a playhouse built for Victoria's children, where they learned to cultivate their own garden.

The Princess Beatrice Garden at Carisbrooke Castle.

designed by Chris Beardshaw, is a tucked away space featuring a mix of period planting and topiary. This tranguil garden was designed in honour of Queen Victoria's youngest daughter and features fountains. climbing roses and historic herbaceous borders. The wider castle grounds have picturesque picnic spots and plenty of room for kids to let off steam.

The former home of Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Farringford has a wonderfully restored walled garden filled with heritage blooms inspired by the 19th-century planting schemes of Tennyson's time. Beyond the walled garden, the estate also features parkland with delightful walking trails, offering scenic views over the rolling countryside.

Mottistone Gardens and Estate, managed by the National Trust, includes a mix of Mediterranean-style planting, winding paths and hidden corners perfect for a romantic stroll. In spring, the orchard is filled with apple blossoms, providing a picture-perfect setting for those Instagram moments, and in summer, beds are filled with a mix of colourful perennials and herbs. Walk from the gardens to the nearby neolithic Longstone to appreciate the sweeping views.

#### FAMILY TIME OUT

Ventnor Botanic Garden with its exotic plant species, dinosaur-themed trails and a great café, is known as 'Britain's hottest garden'. Thanks to Ventnor's unique microclimate, the garden is home to a variety of rare and subtropical plants, including palm trees and cacti. The garden also features an underground mushroom farm and a medicinal garden showcasing plants with healing properties. Kids will enjoy the adventurous tunnel walkways, while parents can relax and take in the stunning sea views.



Godshill Model Village is a combination of gardens and intricate miniature versions of Island locations, including Godshill itself.

While known for its adventure play, newly reopened Robin Hill's woodland gardens and scenic walks offer an added touch of natural beauty. The ancient woodland valley is filled with blossoming wildflowers in spring and features woodland sculptures hidden among the trees. Keep your eyes peeled for the Island's favourite residents, the red squirrels.

For pure, old-fashioned whimsy, Godshill Model Village, a combination of gardens and intricate model buildings, is a place that kids will love. Miniature trees, carefully pruned to scale, surround tiny versions of local landmarks and the landscaped gardens are beautifully tended, featuring floral displays that mirror the miniature world inside.

Watch the entire butterfly life cycle in action and even have the chance to see a butterfly emerge from its chrysalis at Butterfly World. This indoor tropical paradise is home to hundreds of butterflies fluttering amongst the flowers, a koi pond and a collection of exotic plants, making it a great day out for nature lovers.



The gardens overlook Shanklin Chine, with stunning coastal views, and the shady mature trees are a lovely place to enjoy an ice cream from the nearby café on a warm spring day.

#### A FEAST FOR THE SENSES

The Garlic Farm is an Island treasure. Set in the heart of the Isle of Wight's countryside, it features beautifully maintained gardens filled with a variety of garlic species, wildflowers and kitchen garden herbs. Visitors can follow farm trails that meander through ancient woodlands and wildflower meadows. There's a well-curated shop where you can sample a wide array of garlic-based products, and the café serves up mouthwatering garlic-infused dishes, including black garlic ice cream for the more adventurous.

## Wightlink in the Community: Ryde Swimming Club

Founded in 2015 by Waterside Community Trust, Ryde Swimming Club (RYDS) are a friendly and competitive swimming club with ages ranging from seven years through to Masters (25+). The club trains at Waterside Pool, next to the boating lake on the Esplanade at Ryde.

The pool is one of the only pools in the UK with a retractable roof – bringing sunshine right into swimming sessions when the weather permits – and is the only one on the Island to have Swim Mark Accreditation from Swim England.

The club aims to develop the swimming skills, stamina and speed of all members. The goal is for all swimmers to achieve the best they can and to improve on their 'personal best' times as well as enjoy the training and make friends along the way.

Waterside is in the blood of Club Deputy Jacob Jenner. With buses crisscrossing the rolling downs, trains stopping off at some seaside towns and a steam engine that chugs through sun-dappled ancient woodland, the Island is certainly home to a host of scenic trips if you go by public transport. So, leave the car or camper back at base and follow us as we shop, sip and snack through our ideal car-free Isle of Wight itinerary.

## IN THE BEGINNING...

If you've just crossed the Solent by FastCat and found yourself at the wet and salty end of Ryde's historic wooden pier, then you've started on an excellent note. From here, you can either take a leisurely walk down the pier or step aboard an Island Line train, which, following an extensive renovation, will reopen during May and provides an impressive introduction to the Isle of Wight. Taking you across the lapping waves and over to the shore, you'll see the skyline of Ryde draw nearer, complete with towering church spires, elegant Georgian townhouses and long stretches of sandy beach.



Thanks to recent refurbishment you can now get the train or stretch your legs on the pedestrian walkway on Ryde Pier.

After disembarking at Ryde Esplanade (don't forget to mind the gap), turn westwards and make your way to the inviting and recently-opened RT Café Grill, run by award-winning chef (and once the UK's youngest Michelin star winner) Robert Thompson. Whether on the seaside terrace or tucked away in the cosy bar, start proceedings with a coffee and cake (the Amalfi lemon cake with vanilla meringue is highly recommended). Once suitably revived, make a quick detour to Union Street and step inside Duxmore Botanics. From citrus-infused bath oils to botanical body washes and candles inspired by the Island's salty sea air, there are plenty of locally-crafted wellness wares to cast an eye over.

## MOVING WEST

From here, the Southern Vectis Number 9 bus will whisk you over to Newport, where you can change to the Summer Links route and continue onwards through the lush green fields of West Wight. The destination is Yarmouth, a historic port town complete with Tudor castle, quaint cottages and a scenic river estuary. Once you've taken in the sights, make sure you turn into Wheatsheaf Lane and head through the door of Fox & Robin, a unique interiors shop run by the charming Christopher Johnson. Whether you're on the lookout for locally-printed nautical lampshades, framed vintage artwork, or stylish Staffordshiremade mugs, this stunning shop won't disappoint.





Bag yourself something beautiful for the home at Fox & Robin in Yarmouth.

With time moving on, a little lunch is in order. Stroll along the riverbank, following the old railway line to Freshwater, then cross the stone bridge and make the steep (but brief) climb up to the Red Lion. Full to the brim with character, and more cosy nooks than you could ever wish for, it's the ideal location for a culinary pitstop. Award-winning chef Sean Jeffers is at the helm here, with a seasonal menu that features such tempting options as the Isle of Wight beef crumpet and the spiced lamb shoulder bonbons. Next, catch the Needles Breezer down into Freshwater Bay and stock up on some retro apparel at Freshwater Bay Vintage – a haven of iconic American fashion. From US army tops to 1980s varsity jackets, there's plenty to try on. P.S. Don't miss the super stylish upcycled and handpainted garments made by local creative Holly Maslen.

#### BACK TO THE DEPOT

Our next route takes us south across rugged clifftops and along scenic twisting stretches of the Military Road (often voted one of the most stunning drives in the country). But before the Island Coaster cruises back onto the Isle of Wight's eastern side and deposits you safely in Shanklin, stop off in Ventnor for a little libation and sustenance.



Ventnor, located on the Island's south coast, is an eclectic mix of seaside charm and Victorian architecture and is perfect for a pit stop.

We'd particularly recommend making a reservation at the Smoking Lobster. Situated on the Esplanade, with views over the sandy beach, the chefs here incorporate Isle of Wight seafood in their exciting pan-Asian inspired menu. Try the steamed bass with clam and white soy dashi or the seared scallops with sake and Avruga caviar sauce.

Stop off at Smallbrook Station and step back in time at the Isle of Wight Steam Railway.

A 10-minute trip back aboard the Island Coaster takes you to Shanklin, a historic seaside town that inspired writers including John Keats, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and Mimi Khalvati. With all those links to creative writing, you can't miss Babushka Books on Regent Street. First opened by an eccentric book collector in the 1950s, it's now in the capable literary hands of Reuben Simpson-Little. Here, you can pick up first-edition John le Carré novels, signed works by Dylan Thomas and a discerning selection of modern fiction. Before setting off on the final furlong, head round the corner to Deli-Cious Artisan Bakery for a well-earned snack. Options include Polish apple pudding, "WZ" chocolate cake or (if you visit on a Saturday) jam-filled pączki doughnuts, all baked by master baker Piotr Banachowski.



Sweet tooth? Deli-Cious have a whole host of freshly baked goodies to tempt you.

From Shanklin, the Island Line trains will whisk you back to Ryde in no time, but if you still have an hour or two for a small detour, disembark a few stops early, at Smallbrook Junction. At this unassuming station, you can cross over to the sooty and atmospheric Isle of Wight Steam Railway, where carriages dating back to 1864 await.





Bookworm? Babushka Books in Shanklin is a real treasure trove of both second-hand and new books, including a discerning selection of modern fiction.

The route takes in quiet rural stations and pockets of ancient woodland, with a chance to see deer and red squirrels as you gently chug by. As the sun begins to set and you pull into your final station, look back on your action-packed day and feel satisfied that you managed to achieve every single bit of it without the need for a car!

# A taste of the past

While it may not be obvious at first sight, the Isle of Wight has a rich and varied food history stretching back many centuries. Scratch beneath the surface and you'll find resurrected local specialities and plenty of pioneering modern producers drawing inspiration from the past. So pull up a chair and unfurl that napkin as we take you on a quick culinary tour.

### HISTORIC SPICED DOUGHNUTS

Made in homes and bakeries across the Island for many centuries, the Isle of Wight doughnut is perhaps our most famous culinary creation. Around the size of a cricket ball, these tasty sweet treats were originally made from a spiced dough which was left to rise next to a fire, filled with wild plums or currants, then fried in boiling lard and drained on clean straw. Despite sharing a name with the American doughnut (which has Dutch origins), the Isle of Wight version appears to have developed completely independently – and can supposedly be traced back as far as the 17th century.

By the Edwardian era, Isle of Wight doughnuts were quickly dying out, however, in more recent years they've had something of a revival. Using an 1845 recipe by celebrated cookbook writer Eliza Acton, the Redrup family of local bakery chain Grace's, have started producing a cinnamon and currant-based variation, using their decades of sugar-sprinkled experience. With bakery outposts in Ryde, Shanklin and Yarmouth, plus a newly opened location in a former bootmaker's shop on Newport High Street, you can't possibly miss them.


### LOCALLY-GROWN CHERRIES

For Islanders of the past, cherries were amongst the most popular fruits around, often baked into puddings and tarts, or used to flavour (and disguise) bottles of smuggled gin. Known as merries in the local dialect – a word said to come from the French word merise – cherry trees grew wild in many parts of the Island, whilst cherry orchards were called merry gardens (a label which lives on in a local street name and pub name, both situated just outside Lake).



You can taste the sunshine in Godshill Orchard's cherry jam and juice.

While most of the Island's orchards have long since disappeared, over in the scenic South Wight village of Godshill, one excellent example is still flourishing today. Run by the Medway family, Godshill Orchards is home to 4,000 trees and 20 different varieties of cherry. Not only can you pick up a punnet of glossy cherries from the farm gate during the summer, you can also buy their homemade cherry juice, cherry chutney or white cherry jam year-round.

## SUN-RIPENED TOMATOES

Back in the year 1900, the Belgian owner of Ventnor's Royal Hotel, Hubert Cloots, was growing tomatoes in his unheated greenhouses and in the decades before him, horticultural hobbyists and the gardeners of grand houses across the Island were growing them too. However, it wouldn't be until the 1950s and 1960s that tomato growing became a bigger industry on the Island, turning the process into a commercial success story and making the Isle of Wight tomato one of our most famous exports.



Any slightly wonky or imperfect tomatoes don't go to waste, but are made it into products such as Isle of Wight Tomatoes pesto instead.

Much of that fame has been down to one trailblazing firm in particular – Isle of Wight Tomatoes. They've been growing tomatoes in the rich and fertile soil of the Arreton Valley for over 15 years, with sustainability top of the agenda. Rainwater is harvested for irrigation, crop waste is recycled and slightly wonky or imperfect tomatoes are used to make tasty products such as pesto, smokey tomato-infused balsamic and Punjabi-inspired curry sauce.

Over the years, Isle of Wight Tomatoes produce has been stocked at farm shops from Dorset to rural Fife and has also been spotted on the hallowed shelves of Selfridges. It's a favourite with celebrity chefs too and often makes an appearance on the menu of Brasserie Zédel (a glitzy upmarket restaurant just off London's Piccadilly Circus).


#### ARTISANAL BREWS

Historically, when raising a glass or wetting a whistle, the first choice for locals tended to be beer. Using locally-grown barley and hops which grew wild in the woods, Islanders brewed all sorts of frothy concoctions, from light swizzles and stronger nammet beers to the very strongest puncheon beer, usually served to harvest workers. Breweries started taking off during the Victorian era, including Newport-based Mew, Langton & Co. which used to supply Osborne House when Queen Victoria was in residence. While none of our 19th-century beer makers still survive today, plenty of smaller-scale artisans have taken the reins and kept our local brewing tradition alive.

One such firm is Wight Knuckle Brewery, an award-winning sustainable craft brewery which began life in the back rooms of the Pilot Boat Inn at Bembridge. Founded by brothers Ed and Fergus, they now operate from the Nunwell Estate, using the highest quality natural British ingredients, alongside local water and a thoroughly modern approach.

Brews include the Wight Knuckle Pale Ale (a refreshingly light creation, with hints of citrus and berries) and their Unfiltered Lager (with a gentle bitterness and captivating floral aroma). Whichever option you plump for, you can sip happily knowing each pint is 100% vegan, and the spent grain is used to feed pigs at Nunwell Home Farm.

## ISLAND-DISTILLED SPIRITS

Whilst we've been home to bubbling gin stills for a number of years, in 2024 the Isle of Wight's food and drink culture started a new chapter, as Wight Whisky became the first local distillery to begin crafting the ancient amber-coloured spirit and released its opening product. Based at New Farm, just outside Brading, the team uses locally farmed barley and fresh water from Knighton Spring to ferment, distil and blend into their 40% ABV Signature Malt Blend.





Wight Whisky are the first local distillery to craft the amber coloured spirit – which makes delicious cocktails including a Wight Mule with ginger ale and lime juice.

This hearty dram features notes of light oak and dried fruits with a creamy honey finish, and is ideal for sipping neat or for mixing into your next Manhattan, Old Fashioned, Whisky Sour or even a Wight Mule. With more products in the pipeline from Wight Whisky, and with a whole host of other passionate food producers across the Island all working hard to achieve big things, the future is certainly looking bright for Isle of Wight gastronomy.

## Wildlife could be lost from the Solent forever

A new report has revealed worrying news about the Solent's natural environment. For the first time, scientists have brought together data showing that some of the Solent's most important habitats and wildlife are disappearing fast. Without action, we could lose them completely in the future.

The Solent State of Nature Report focuses on a few key habitats you might not have heard of before – like salt marsh, seagrass meadows, mudflats and oyster beds. These areas are vital for wildlife, acting like underwater forests and feeding grounds. But the report shows that three of these habitats could vanish from the Solent altogether in the next 100-200 years unless we step in to help. One – the oyster beds – has already almost completely gone.

It's not just habitats under threat. Many types of birds and fish that rely on these spaces are also struggling, with numbers falling fast.

The Solent isn't just a beautiful stretch of water – it's also a vital home for wildlife. Every year, thousands of coastal and marine birds rely on the area to feed, nest or shelter over the winter, and its harbours and estuaries provide important nursery grounds for young fish, rays and even sharks. In 2023 alone, more than 11,500 pairs of seabirds bred here, and the Solent is especially important for a species called the Dark-bellied Brent Goose, which travels thousands of miles to spend winter on our shores.

But these natural spaces do much more than support wildlife. They also help tackle climate change by storing carbon, protecting our coasts from erosion and even helping clean the water.

Despite all of this, the new report has found that the Solent's habitats are under serious threat. Even though much of the area is officially protected, human activity – including pollution and the effects of climate change – is putting increasing pressure on this delicate environment. Some of these vital habitats are already disappearing, and once they're gone, they could be lost forever.


But there's good news too – efforts to turn things around are already underway. The Solent Seascape Project, which commissioned the Solent State of Nature Report, is leading the charge. It's the first project of its kind in the UK, working to protect and restore nature right across the Solent, and it's even part of the UN's global Ocean Decade initiative.

The project has already started bringing life back to the Solent in several places. This includes creating new oyster reefs, planting seagrass meadows, restoring salt marsh and protecting important seabird nesting sites. Together, these efforts aim to help nature recover, turning the Solent from a struggling environment into a thriving, healthy and connected ecosystem once again.

Wightlink is proud to support the Solent Seascape Project, helping scientists and conservation teams travel to and from the Isle of Wight to carry out this vital work.



# North

The north of the Island is home to possibly the best-known town on the Isle of Wight, Cowes. Long associated with sailing and all things nautical, Cowes is a hive of activity during the summer months...

From the sailing competitions including the Round the Island Race and Cowes Week, to dry land entertainment, there are a multitude of events taking place. Many of the pubs that line the High Street have live music playing and street entertainers – it's a real party atmosphere. A summer stroll from Cowes to the neighbouring village of Gurnard is a must, with perfect vantage points lining

this flat and even walk. Upon arrival, you will find Gurnard to be a pretty little village with a couple of pubs, a post-office-come-coffee shop and a peppering of beach huts lining the esplanade.

Across the River Medina is East Cowes. Once the holiday destination of Queen Victoria and her family, a trip to the Island would not be complete without a tour around her palatial holiday home, Osborne. It was built between 1845 and 1851 in a quintessential Italian Renaissance palazzo style, with its sweeping terraces, towers and stunning formal gardens leading down to a beautiful beach, only accessible through the grounds.



## Wightlink in the Community: Wight Gymnasts (Xcel)

Wight Gymnasts was founded in April 2024 to meet the needs of elite gymnasts who were no longer able to train on the Isle of Wight. Many of the gymnasts had been training from the age of three with a variety of local clubs, but due to the lack of specialist facilities and coaches, had outgrown what the Island had to offer.

The gymnasts have achieved great success in the last few years winning medals at every competition attended across England and Wales, including regional grades and finals. They also earned spaces in the Hampshire Squad which is a remarkable achievement given the limited training facilities available on the Isle of Wight.

In April 2024, their previous club became unable to offer competitive gymnastics at the level they needed. Wight Gymnasts provides support and fundraising towards the gymnasts' expenses. They now have no choice but to travel to the mainland and three of them have secured places at Xcel Gymnastics in Horndean, (the Wight Gymnasts Xcel) with the others training at Portsmouth Gymnastics Club. The girls are training and competing along a regional/ national competitive pathway and hope to realise their dreams of national success.

# North East



The north east has everything going for it. From the miles of golden sands that hug the coastline, to the wildlife-rich limestone ledges off St Helens Duver and the hustle and bustle of the Island's largest town, Ryde...

Here you will find miles of perfect sandy beaches coupled with excellent entertainment. Stripey beach huts sit alongside coastal cafés and restaurants, whilst traditional funfairs, trampolines, a bowling alley and a boating lake provide hours of entertainment for all the family. The town itself is built up a hill that provides wonderful views when looking back down towards the Solent and the pre-Victorian pier. You will find a good range of boutique shops for that one-off treasure, as well as plenty of places to relax with a drink and a bite to eat.

Venturing out of Ryde you will undoubtedly stumble across Seaview. The picturesque Edwardian coastal town has a nostalgic charm, with regattas galore during the summer months and the sea is busy with Mermaid boats and kitesurfers. The beaches here are slightly quieter and have a distinctly desert island feel.


Round the corner, before you hit the most easterly tip of the Island you will pass through the village of St Helens, known for its large village green that forms the centre. On the outskirts towards Brading, Oasis is well worth a visit. Family owned and run, this shop is a veritable treasure trove, packed with interesting and unique items for the home – many hand-picked in Bali. They also have a coffee shop where the cakes are worth the visit alone!

The small parish of Fishbourne could be mistaken for not much more than a place to get on and off the Island at Wightlink's ferry port, but you would be missing a trick. It is the ideal place to start a walk to neighbouring Quarr Abbey along a well-trodden path. Quarr Abbey was built next to the ruins of the original abbey in 1911. There are beautiful grounds to explore, where you will find pigs to feed and watch as they revel in the mud. The Tea Shop does a superb ploughman's and the Farm Shop stocks the Abbey's own produce, including the refreshing Quarr Abbey Ale.

Further inland, you can step into a perfectly preserved piece of history. The Isle of Wight Steam Railway provides a brilliant family day out. Take the steam train along the line from Wootton to Smallbrook Junction. Alight at Havenstreet for a trip around the award-winning Train Story Discovery Centre, watch engines being renovated or stretch your legs and venture through the Woodland Walk.



Based in the centre of Ryde, the club has a large group of young and not-so-young members who train at the club regularly. As well as the undoubted benefits of adapting to high levels of physical fitness through demanding boxing training, trainers Steve and Mark also see a huge improvement in confidence, communication skills, following instructions, teamwork and discipline. This is especially true for some of the younger members who may not have grown up with the benefit of a structure in their lives.

The club have close links with community groups, as well as the Isle of Wight police and youth workers, with occasional referrals which the team are able to assist with through the boxing programme.

If the boxers show promise, they progress through the ranks into regular sparring sessions with other clubs on the mainland and then can enter competitions with Southern County boxing clubs.

Being based on the Island allows members of the club the unique advantage of regular training runs along Ryde beachfront and no shortage of hill climbs to build stamina. The fresh air and natural environment on the Island, with large open spaces, give a great incentive to their training routine.

The sponsorship from Wightlink facilitates travel across the Solent for training and competitions, which would be otherwise unaffordable, as the club is fully self-funded. These trips are important as they undoubtedly raise the confidence of the boxers and broaden their horizons. It's more than just the boxing.

# West

The West Wight is a stunning part of the Island. Fields, forests and miles of coastline stretch out ahead of you as you go west...

Open space, unspoiled landscapes and rugged coastline, plus pretty towns and villages, lively pubs and independent shops make this a top destination. If you're arriving on the Wightlink ferry from Lymington, you will find yourself in the heart of Yarmouth. This historic harbour town contains some of the Island's oldest architecture, including English Heritage's 16th century Yarmouth Castle, the last addition to King Henry VIII's coastal defences.

The beauty of the west has inspired many artists over the years including Julia Margaret Cameron, the pioneering art photographer and her neighbour Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Poet Laureate during Queen Victoria's reign. Take a walk from Freshwater Bay to the Tennyson Monument and the panoramic views mean it's not hard to see why. The poet used to walk on the down almost every day, saying that the air was worth 'sixpence a pint'.

No trip over to this side would be complete without a visit to the iconic landmark of The Needles. The three chalk stacks and the classic red and white striped lighthouse are synonymous with the Isle of Wight, adorning many a picture postcard. Take a chairlift ride down to Alum Bay, past the coloured sands.

The west side has more than its fair share of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, with Newtown perhaps being the jewel in the crown. A village built on the site of a medieval borough and a nature reserve makes for a great day out. Spot red squirrels, egrets and even a resident seal as you take a stroll around the estuary.

Brighstone is a pretty and busy village, nestled between the chalk downland to the north and stretching to the south-west facing coast. Famous for numerous dinosaur finds in the eroding cliffs, stop off along the way at Isle of Wight Pearl in Brighstone for some of the most impressive views of the English Channel and a beautiful shop dedicated to pearls, catering for all styles and tastes, plus The Pearl Café is open daily.

# Best beach for watersports: COMPTON BAY

Well known for its waves and when they are big, Compton is great for surfing and when they are small, even better for bodyboarding and just general fun in the water. The reddish sand is backed by natural cliffs. Take the wooden steps down but don't forget your beach gear - there is a car park, toilet and ice cream van within walking distance.



# Best beach for swimming: FRESHWATER BAY

Once you have made your way down to the sea (we suggest wearing sea shoes as this is a pebbly beach) you will be rewarded with almost instantly deep water, perfect for swimming. Swim round to the secret coves that can't be accessed by foot. Do let someone know if you are going swimming as this beach does not have a lifeguard but does have an independent lifeboat station.

# Best beach for sunsets: COLWELL

They say west is best and that is certainly the case when it comes to sunsets. The beach at Colwell provides a stunning display with Hurst Castle creating a dramatic silhouette across the Solent. Take a dip in the sea here for an evening swim followed by a drink at one of the few pubs and eateries nearby.

Despite the name, the Young Farmers Club is for everyone – members don't need to come from a farming background, just have an interest in agriculture, animals and the outdoors. The club aims to help the next generation and increase the amount of people who work in the agricultural industry on the Island, while also allowing them to develop as young people and to learn new skills.

Membership costs just £60 per year and is open to those aged 10 to 28. With meetings taking place on Wednesday evenings at least twice a month, the YFC is great for meeting new people, making friends and learning more about rural life, all whilst having fun!

Chair of the Isle of Wight Young Farmers, Siân Grove, is a first-generation shepherdess and began her farming career through her local Young Farmers Club. She now has her own flock of sheep, and although her main job is as Secretary for the Royal Isle of Wight County Show, Siân is also an NFU Student & Young Farmer Ambassador, and Secretary for the IOW Gilten Market.

"I love being an Island girlie, and I think we are very fortunate to have such a fantastic farming community on the Island, it is something I'm incredibly proud to be a part of I'm also a bit of a water baby, so I love that a beach is never more than 15 minutes away, with my favourite being Freshwater Bay. One of my favourite walks is from The Needles to the Chalkpit car park, which usually ends in a pint at the High Down Inn!

YFC is a national club, with most counties having individually run clubs. As such, there are a lot of events and competitions that take place on the mainland that we, as a charity, wouldn't be able to attend without the support from Wightlink. This also allows our young people to network, learn new skills and develop personally.

We have had the highest membership number this year, which is continuing to grow year on year and have taken part in and supported a lot of local Island events, such as Brighstone Christmas Tree Festival, Gilten Market, Newport Carnival, the Sheepdog Trials, the Royal IW County Show, Chale Show, the Scarecrow Festival. # Central



At the heart of the Island you will find several quaint villages, as well as the Island's capital town, Newport. Here you will enjoy a mixture of High Street names and some excellent independent boutiques for both fashion and homewares...

The town centres around two main squares then stretches down to the historic quay where you will find an art gallery and café. The Bargeman's Rest pub sits on the water's edge and is an ideal spot to relax.

For local heritage, Carisbrooke Castle is hard to beat. The history of the castle can be traced back to about AD 1000. Raided by both the Spanish and French, the castle's most famous inhabitant was King Charles I, who was imprisoned here during the Civil War between 1647–1648, before being executed in 1649.

Take a drive through Arreton and be sure to stop off at Arreton Barns, the Island's largest centre for arts and crafts. Here you will find traditional crafters mixed with contemporary artisans. There is also a pub serving real ales and home-cooked food, a farm shop packed to the


rafters with local produce and The Corn Exchange – a beautiful interiors and giftware store.
