



Waves of excitement

Taking a dip in the sea is all well and good, but get more from those lapping Isle of Wight waves this summer with a spot of watersports. From coasteering and surfing, to windsurfing and kayaking, there's truly something for everyone. Plus, we've got a few tips on nautical know-how from the team at Yarmouth RNLI to ensure smooth sailing (and no rough waters!)

iSURF

Not many people know that the Isle of Wight holds a pioneering place in British surfing history, with our first local surfing club hitting the waves at Ventnor back in 1965. Hop on a board and help continue that legacy with a surfing session from iSurf. Usually taking place at Compton Beach (a rugged stretch of coastline, where robust waves roll in from the Atlantic), you'll be shown the ropes over the course of an hour and a half, with experienced instructor Chris Mannion there to guide you. After donning a lifejacket and wetsuit, surfers of eight years and older will take to the water, ready to start riding those waves.

FRESHWATER BAY COASTEERING

If rock jumping, sea swimming and belly flopping are more likely to put the wind in your sails, then consider a session of coasteering. Treating the coastal environment as a giant natural playground, the seasoned instructors at Freshwater Bay Coasteering will lead you through caves, over ledges and amongst a range of nautical obstacles, all with the stunning chalk cliffs of West Wight as your backdrop. Choose from either the challenging high water adventure (punctuated with rock climbing and body surfing), or the more gentle low-water alternative (with caving, rock scrambling and the odd bit of sea swimming).



As long as you can swim 100 metres confidently in the sea, you're good to go, and with helmets, wetsuits, and buoyancy aids ready and waiting, you know you're in safe hands.

TACKT-ISLE ADVENTURES

For something a little more sedate and family-friendly, set coordinates for Woodnutt's Yard, located amongst the sand dunes of The Duver at St. Helens. Here, Tackt-Isle Adventures offer a range of water-based activities, ranging from dinghy sailing and windsurfing to kayaking and canoeing.



Pick up a paddle with Tackt-Isle and explore the Island's coastline.

Amongst the options on offer, we'd highly recommend the Canoe Adventure – a three-hour guided paddle to a secluded beach, with a stop for lunch or a swim, as well as an option to include a short session of bushcraft too. Ideal for canoeists of all abilities, from eight years and up, Ben, Ollie or George will show you the ropes (and how to get back on board if you accidentally capsize) so you can feel calm and confident before heading out onto the open waves.

SALTY SAILING

Perhaps you prefer to be at the helm of a more substantial vessel, complete with anchors to weigh and sails to unfurl. Thankfully, Salty Sailing have got you covered, with beginner, refresher and 'skills and drills' courses available on board their very own shipshape yacht.

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
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Learn to sail and see the Isle of Wight from a unque perspective with Salty Sailing.

Based in Shephards Marina in the maritime town of Cowes (internationally famous for its annual sailing regatta), you'll set sail for the Solent, before Salty Sailing's patient and friendly skippers teach you everything from man overboard procedure, to the skills you'll need to start training for a Royal Yachting Association certification. If, however, you decide you're not that keen on getting stuck in after all, the firm also offers a sailing charter service, which can whisk you away to tranquil Newtown Creek for a picnic on the water, or cruise round to Osborne Bay so you can dive into its chilly waters (where Queen Victoria also did a few strokes back in the day).

ISLE OF WIGHT AQUA PARK

For those curious about watersports, but with a fear of the open sea, we've got the ideal alternative for you. Safely inland, at Tapnell Farm, you'll find the Isle of Wight Aqua Park, an inflatable water-based assault course, encompassing twenty floating challenges such as bouncy stepping stones, ramps and staircases. What's more, there's a spectator area, where friends and family can watch you slip and slide your way to victory, or perhaps go down with a splash.

Anyone seven years and older (with a height of at least 110 centimetres too) can take part, with buoyancy aids and wetsuits on hand, plus trained lifeguards and first aiders watching over the proceedings. And, to recharge after those intense 55 minutes on the water, treat yourself to one of the best burgers on the Island, over at The Cow.

THEO VICKERS ROCKPOOL SAFARIS

Last, but by no means least, there's another unusual way to get involved with the Island's marine environment without a helmet or lifejacket in sight. Try a rockpool safari from local marine biologist (and award-winning underwater photographer) Theo Vickers, where you'll discover the incredible and varied wildlife hidden amongst the nooks and crannies of the Isle of Wight shoreline.



So far, Theo's safaris have encountered over 140 marine species, and with a bit of luck, you might be able to spot anything from blennies and black-headed shrimp to velvet crabs and straight-nosed pipefish. Assisted by marine specialist Laura McConnell, sessions take place at Seaview Duver, Bembridge Ledge, Castle Cove and Compton, with sightings being submitted to the local biological records scheme to help environmental researchers of the future.

STAYING SAFE AT SEA

For those thinking of testing out some watersports on their own, keep these top safety tips in mind:

- It is always safer (and usually a lot more fun!) to try watersports activities with friends, but if you're heading out on the water alone, take a means of communication and let someone on dry land know where you're going and what time you expect to be back.
- Always have a scan of the tide times well in advance; it's important to know if the tide will be coming in or if it's on its way out. What about the wind, is it blowing onshore or offshore? Inflatable kayaks and paddleboards can easily be swept out to sea.
- Trying your hand at surfing? Remember to keep that ankle leash on, so you and your board don't become separated in the swell. Look out for rip currents and, if you do get caught in one, swim at right angles to the shore until you are clear of it.
- When exploring rockpools or caving, don your grippiest footwear, so you can stride amongst the rocks and seaweed with ease and remember to watch out for a rising tide; it is very easy to get cut off.

 If you just fancy a swim, don't go out of your depth unless you are a confident swimmer, and opt for beaches manned by lifeguards. At this time of year, the water can still be very cold and may take your breath away, so if you do find yourself struggling, just float for a minute until you get used to it, and then call for help or swim ashore.

 Once you're back ashore, make sure you've got some warm clothes to slip into and a hot drink ready to take away any chills.

Eating al fresco

It's a well-known fact that the Isle of Wight punches well above its weight when it comes to food, and while there are plenty of pleasant restaurant and pub interiors, you can't beat sitting down to a meal outdoors. So, unfurl that napkin and make the most of those precious rays of British sunshine, with our guide to some of the finest local spots to dine al fresco.

THE SUN INN

As far as locations go, The Sun Inn at Hulverstone should be pretty hard to beat. Set in a rural West Wight hamlet, this centuries-old stone pub with a thatched roof boasts a restful and grassy beer garden with views across the undulating fields and out to sea. Homemade pies are in high demand here, while options from the specials board include dishes such as pan-fried sea bream with lemon and chilli butter, BBQ pork loaded poppadoms and turkey Thai green curry. If you're feeling a bit on the thirsty side

The Sun offers an IPA and a bitter on tap from sustainable Brading-based brewers Wight Knuckle, as well as a range of beers from some more well-known names, such as London Pride. If Hulverstone is just a bit too far away, try the equally characterful Fisherman's Cottage, which sits a (very short) stone's throw from the Shanklin Chine.

WIGHTWOOD PIZZA

Meanwhile, further west, local foodie fans can often be found queuing up for artisan (and surprisingly affordable) pizzas from Wightwood Pizza's vintage Citroën truck. Parked up at Yarmouth Harbour on Tuesday nights, and along the shore at Freshwater Bay on Friday and Sunday evenings. Every pizza is made from scratch by owner Josh, with vegan cheese options available on demand. Pre-order by text to get your request in early, whether you're plumping for the classic margherita (made with Arreton Valley tomatoes), or specials such as the chorizo, mascarpone and roquito chilli. Then, as the sun begins to set, find a spot to sit by the sea and tuck into your artisan slice of deliciousness.





TRUE FOOD KITCHEN AT CASTLEHAVEN BEACH

Perhaps a little splurge is in order for a special occasion, in which case, try the upmarket True Food Kitchen, located in the idyllic fishing cove of Castlehaven. Perched on the Island's very southern tip, you'll find stunning views across the sparkly blue waters of The Channel, as well as an Asian influenced menu, often using locally-caught seafood.



True Food Kitchen at Castlehaven is an off-the-beaten-track hidden gem serving Asian influenced food and amazing sea views.

Take a seat on the decked clifftop terrace and pick from such enticing menu options as bao buns with teriyaki tofu and miso mayo, or Wagyu beef burger with tempura nobashi prawns, yuzu and chilli mayo. There are also Hawaiian poke bowls on offer and a short but sweet selection of desserts. Once you're feeling refreshed and revived, it's only a brief but scenic walk to the impressive Victorian lighthouse of St. Catherine's. Alternatively, if you're spending time in West Wight, make a reservation at the recently revamped Albion Hotel, where outdoor dining tables overlook the dramatic Stag Rock.

THE RESTAURANT AT FORESTERS HALL

For something completely different, head to the historic winding streets of Cowes, where, amongst the colourful Georgian cottages and circling seagulls, sits the impressive Foresters Hall. Tucked away at the back of this boutique hotel is a sophisticated restaurant, complete with a walled sun-trap of a terrace, well-dressed outdoor dining tables and top-notch service.



What could be better than a cocktail and dinner overlooking the sea at the Albion Hotel?

At the helm is chef Jay Santiago (known locally for his stints at a number of classy dining venues), whose revamped menu features finely crafted dishes, including Moroccan lamb rump skewers with tahini vierge and honeyed labneh. Alternatively, there's also the 'nduja and local crab linguine, with the hand-picked crustaceans sourced every morning from Yarmouth firm We've Got Crabs. If lunch just isn't lunch without a little drop of wine, Foresters Hall offers an impressive selection of small-vineyard bottles, sourced by Cowes-based wine specialist Wine Therapy. Booking recommended.

FIN'S BEACH CAFÉ

Meanwhile, over in Sandown, sisters Molly and Betty have been offering up healthy breakfast, brunch and lunch dishes from their seaside hut on the Western Revetment since 2021. Located just metres from the vast sandy shore, Fin's Beach Café is a popular spot with locals and is especially well-known for its smoothie bowls. Try the Island Lover for instance, which includes a base of mango, pineapple and banana, topped with raspberries, passion fruit, desiccated coconut and a maple-pecan granola.

If you're craving something savoury instead, pick from fish tacos with mango salsa, gochujang chicken burger, loaded hash browns and more. For summery beverages to match the sunny seaside location, order a cool mango-mint refresher, tropical frappe, or 'Nutty Professor' smoothie. If, however, you prefer your brunch to come in the form of homemade cake, make your way to the award-winning Blueberrys Café, perched on the clifftops north of Shanklin.

SCENIC SPOTS TO PICNIC

With so many impressive local food and drink products on offer, there's always the option of assembling your own Isle of Wight al fresco meal and picking from any number of scenic picnic spots to enjoy it. Start with some seven-seeded bread from Lost Mill Bakery, before adding in heritage speciality tomatoes from Isle of Wight Tomatoes and creamy red cheese from Briddlesford Farm.

For the adults, add in a mixed drink from The Isle of Wight Cocktail Company, such as a Wight Vesper Martini, and for younger attendees, a bottle of Godshill Orchards cloudy apple juice. Once your picnic blanket is ready to be shaken out and carefully laid down, consider laying it on the grassy slopes of Carisbrooke Castle, in the cool shadow of Bembridge Windmill, or amongst the heather and gorse of Headon Warren (with impressive coastal views of the Needles as your backdrop).

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




So, whether you're packing the trusty tent to take it back to basics or on the hunt for a full boutique glamping escape, our guide has plenty of ideas for all budgets.

A VERY BRITISH SAFARI

Make the most of your summer holidays with a very British safari! Okay, we can't promise awe-inspiring sightings (unless goats are your thing), but we can promise that a stay in one of Tom's Eco Lodge safari tents will feel like you're deep in the heart of the Serengeti – just without the heat, mosquitoes, or risk of becoming a lion's lunch.

Set among the sprawling grounds of family-favourite Tapnell Farm, these spacious tents offer panoramic views over the Downs, the Solent, and beyond. With access to award-winning attractions and amenities, including The Cow, home of the "Best Burger on the Island", the luxury safari tents at Tom's promise to leave you refreshed, recharged, and maybe just a little reluctant to leave.

Situated on the outskirts of Freshwater, Glamping the Wight Way delivers the pinnacle of luxury camping and is just a 30-minute walk from the beautiful waters of Colwell Bay, as well as one of the Island's culinary crown jewels, The Hut.

Their cosy lodges are styled from top to bottom with comfort in mind, offering a stay that's as indulgent as it is relaxing. Set in a prime location surrounded by scenic walking trails, cycle routes, and perfectly positioned with minimal light pollution for nights of truly breathtaking stargazing, this is how glamping should look.

The safari tents at Tom's Eco Lodges at Tapnell Farm give you all the feel of being out in the wild but will all the comforts of home.

BUDGET-FRIENDLY BUNKING

Perched on the cliffs of Brighstone with staggering views across the English Channel, Grange Farm Campsite offers one of the most enviable camping spots on the Island. With over two acres of open land and a path leading directly to Brighstone Bay below, it's a prime location for seaside adventurers. Choose from traditional pitches, cosy cliffside cottages, cute shepherds' huts or a selection of fully furnished caravans – all offering fantastic value without skimping on the scenery.



Pitch up at Grange Farm at Brighstone, and you're just a stones throw from the sand – don't forget your bucket and spade!



Well, for ease of getting to, I have to say Appley Beach in Ryde is my favourite. It's less than a 10-minute walk from my house!



Glorious Godshill



HISTORY

Godshill, as you may have guessed from its name, has a history entwined with faith. At the brow of the hill stands the medieval All Saints Church, which can be seen from miles away. Local legend goes that the original foundations were laid in the village, and each morning the villagers would wake to find the foundations had been moved to the top of the hill by an unknown force. It's well worth the trek up stone steps to reach the peaceful sanctuary, where you can take in a stained-glass window by artist and craftsman William Morris. Notably, the church is also home to a lily crucifix – a rare symbol found in Anglican churches and one of only two paintings in Europe.

THINGS TO DO

The Model Village, tucked away in the grounds of The Old Vicarage, is a highly engaging attraction reminiscent of a bygone era. Originally built in 1952 and lovingly maintained over the years, the detailed model depicts both Godshill and Shanklin's Old Village. Set in beautiful, landscaped gardens, the detailed scenes can keep both children and adults entertained for hours. The expertly curated site is a Royal Horticultural Society partner garden, with an impressive collection of conifers, shrubs and even bonsai trees, which are sure to delight any keen gardener.

Take a leisurely wander around The Old Smithy and browse the extensive collection of gifts, clothing and accessories.

If you're after some souvenirs or just a spot of retail therapy, pay a visit to The Old Smithy. For those who enjoy sampling local produce, a stroll to Hollow Lane will take you to Vivienne's Larder, a self-service shop offering fresh, seasonal fruit and vegetables and Island milk. Owned by Godshill Orchards, this hidden gem houses luscious locally-grown cherries and apricots, as well as a delicious range of jams and chutneys.

If you're keen to get active, Godshill is a great base for rambling, with circular walks of varying lengths around the village. For those wanting to explore a little further afield, we recommend heading towards Appuldurcombe House, the grand remains of 18th-century English Baroque architecture, now managed by English Heritage and open to the public. A former priory, convent, home and even hotel, it's rumoured to be one of the most haunted places on the island.

Supporting sea life beneath the surface

We're proud to share that the waters around our ferry ports at Ryde Pier and Portsmouth Harbour are playing host to some extraordinary marine visitors – and not just passing through. Seahorses and cuttlefish, two iconic species of British marine life, have been using our ports as safe spaces for the cuttlefish to lay their eggs and the seahorse to raise their live newborn young.

As part of a partnership with the University of Portsmouth, postgraduate students have installed special underwater habitats at both locations. These act like nurseries, offering cuttlefish and seahorses somewhere to shelter and spawn. The fact that they're choosing these waters to reproduce is a strong sign that the local marine environment is healthy and suitable for life.

This is now the third year of the study, and monitoring continues to show that both species are making use of the artificial habitats. It's particularly encouraging because cuttlefish have seen their numbers fall in recent years due to overfishing and loss of habitat. By providing them with new safe spaces, we're helping nature bounce back.

The work is part of Wightlink's wider Green Solent Project – our commitment to protecting the Solent's precious environment. As a ferry company, we're not just travelling across the water, we're part of the marine landscape. That means doing our bit to look after it, whether it's investing in cleaner vessels or supporting marine science and conservation.





North -

The north of the Island is home to possibly the best-known town on the Isle of Wight, Cowes. Long associated with sailing and all things nautical, Cowes is a hive of activity during the summer months...

From the sailing competitions, including the Round the Island Race and Cowes Week, to dry land entertainment, there are a multitude of events taking place. Many of the pubs that line the High Street have live music playing and street entertainers – it's a real party atmosphere. A summer stroll from Cowes to the neighbouring village of Gurnard is a must, with perfect

vantage points lining this flat and even walk. Upon arrival, you will find Gurnard to be a pretty little village with a couple of pubs, a post-office-come-coffee shop and a peppering of beach huts lining the esplanade.

Across the River Medina is East Cowes. Once the holiday destination of Queen Victoria and her family, a trip to the Island would not be complete without a tour around her palatial holiday home, Osborne. It was built between 1845 and 1851 in a quintessential Italian Renaissance palazzo style, with its sweeping terraces, towers and stunning formal gardens leading down to a beautiful beach, only accessible through the grounds.

Best beach for some sailing action:
COWES

Cowes is the Mecca for all things sailing. The beach itself is shingle and you can often unearth some sea glass treasures. Watch out for passing cruise ships and high-octane sailing sports.



Best beach for sunsets: GURNARD

Gurnard is a great place to catch a sunset as it lights up the sky over the Solent.

The beach is pebbly and good for swimming – just watch out for learner dinghy sailors. There is a pub and public toilets close by. Keep your eyes peeled too, as the beach also benefits from regular visits from an ice cream van!

Best beach to feel like a queen: OSBORNE

Not just any beach, this was Queen Victoria's beach. Accessed via paid entry to Osborne, take a stroll through the Italianate-style gardens or catch the shuttle bus. Once here, you will find a café serving up classic ice creams and teas and coffees, plus Queen Victoria's bathing machine.

Inspirational Islanders: Jack Singleton, WightWanderer

Born in Newport, content creator Jack lived in France for 8 years before returning in 2009 to study for a music degree. In 2023, he started the WightWanderer YouTube channel, which he writes, produces and presents alongside his partner, Eleanor. Devoted to telling the story of the Island's history, especially its railways, videos are released weekly, and the channel has over 3.6k subscribers.

"When it comes to the benefits of living on the Isle of Wight, there are perhaps too many to mention, but for someone who is interested in history, it is a treasure trove of information. The Island, in general, is just a wonderful place to walk and discover. No matter where you are, there will always be something to find and beauty to witness. Work can be a little difficult to find, but much easier if you network, something I wish I'd learnt earlier on. Indeed, once you do find your way, it can be a great way of socialising and meeting new locals.

My favourite place is the Isle of Wight Steam Railway. It's a wonderful place that I can't seem to escape. The work that goes into preserving the railway and the Island's heritage on site is extensive and thoroughly enjoyable to watch/take part in.

I'm not much of a beach goer, but I think Yaverland is the prettiest, though there are many to choose from. Yaverland was once the home of one of my favourite Island character stories involving a mischievous lady called Dorothy O'Grady,

who caused chaos during WW2 pretending to be a German spy; the topic of whether she was or wasn't a spy is still debated to this day. I think that's why I like the place, it's mysterious.

There are two places I'd recommend for a walk, the first being St Boniface to St Martin's Down, also known as the horseshoe plateau and possibly the best views on the Island, accessible via Ventnor or Shanklin. The second is Newtown Creek, a birdwatcher's paradise and one of the most historically fascinating places on the Isle of Wight. Newtown was once the largest port town on the Island until it was hit first by the Plague of 1348 and later by a French invasion in 1377, which destroyed almost all its architecture. The town never recovered, and all that is left today is a small yet achingly beautiful hamlet overlooking the Creek.

Natural bias would have me say the Isle of Wight Steam Show (22-25 August) is my favourite, but the Island is so diverse when it comes to events that it is very hard to pick just one. The Isle of Wight Classic Motor Show (6-7 September) is a superb car show which lasts the weekend. It has grown increasingly in size over the last couple of years and is always a wonderful event to attend.

If I had but an hour on the Island (assuming I'm arriving and departing from a ferry dock), I would inevitably go to the pub. The King Lud on Ryde Esplanade has always been a favourite of mine and serves a great pint, then perhaps a nice stroll along the wonderful beach at Appley before returning to the pier."

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North East



The beaches here are slightly quieter and have a distinctly desert island feel.

Around the corner, before you hit the most easterly tip of the Island, you will pass through the village of St Helens, known for its large village green that forms the centre. On the outskirts towards Brading, Oasis is well worth a visit. Family-owned and run, this shop is a veritable treasure trove, packed with interesting and unique items for the home, many hand-picked in Bali. They also have a coffee shop where the cakes are worth the visit alone!

The small parish of Fishbourne could be mistaken for not much more than a place to get on and off the Island at Wightlink's ferry port, but you would be missing a trick. It is the ideal place to start a walk to neighbouring Quarr Abbey along a well-trodden path. Quarr Abbey was built next to the ruins of the original abbey in 1911. There are beautiful grounds to explore, where you will find pigs to feed and watch as they revel in the mud. The Tea Shop does a superb ploughman's and the Farm Shop stocks the Abbey's own produce, including the refreshing Quarr Abbey Ale.

Further inland, you can step into a perfectly preserved piece of history. The Isle of Wight Steam Railway provides a brilliant family day out. Take the steam train along the line from Wootton to Smallbrook Junction. Alight at Havenstreet for a trip around the award-winning Train Story Discovery Centre, watch engines being renovated or stretch your legs and venture through the Woodland Walk.





"The Isle of Wight is a calm and peaceful place that harks back to tradition rather than modernisation. There are lots of beautiful walks and views right on your doorstep.

My favourite place on the Island is St Mary's Church, Carisbrooke. It is stunning to look at on the inside, peaceful bells to listen to and beautiful views.



South

Ventnor is a real mini-Mediterranean town, bustling with pavement cafés, where people sit and take in the views of the English Channel. The town has a distinct artisan vibe, as zigzag roads with Victorian terraces lead down to one-off shops including art galleries, vintage and antique emporiums and jewellers. There are plenty of independent eateries that use local produce. Being close to the sea, seafood is, of course, a local speciality. Watch the fishermen sail in on their boats and then pick up the day's catch at the shop on the harbour. Try one of the pubs and restaurants that will be offering fresh fish as the daily special, such as The Spyglass Inn which sits atop the sea wall.

The unique climate of the south is perhaps best experienced with a trip to Ventnor Botanic Garden, where you will find an unrivalled selection of subtropical and exotic plants and flowers set in 22 acres. From the garden, take a walk down to Steephill Cove, where after the (many) steps, you will be rewarded with a picturesque cove and a smattering of eateries serving up the speciality of locally-caught crab.

A visit over this side provides the perfect excuse for a trip to the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary, where everyone is welcome, including well-behaved dogs. Rugged beaches, steep cliffs and beautiful walks, the south coast has it all, and it's no wonder it has inspired a few famous names over the years, including Charles Dickens, who wrote several chapters of David Copperfield here.



West

The West Wight is a stunning part of the Island. Fields, forests and miles of coastline stretch out ahead of you as you go west...

Open space, unspoiled landscapes and rugged coastline, plus pretty towns and villages, lively pubs and independent shops make this a top destination. If you're arriving on the Wightlink ferry from Lymington, you will find yourself in the heart of Yarmouth. This historic harbour town contains some of the Island's oldest architecture, including English Heritage's 16th–century Yarmouth Castle, the last addition to King Henry VIII's coastal defences.

The beauty of the west has inspired many artists over the years, including Julia Margaret Cameron, the pioneering art photographer and her neighbour Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Poet Laureate during Queen Victoria's reign. Take a walk from Freshwater Bay to the Tennyson Monument, and the panoramic views mean it's not hard to see why. The poet used to walk on the down almost every day, saying that the air was worth 'sixpence a pint'.

No trip over to this side would be complete without a visit to the iconic landmark of The Needles. The three chalk stacks and the classic red and white striped lighthouse are synonymous with the Isle of Wight, adorning many a picture postcard. Take a chairlift ride down to Alum Bay, past the coloured sands.

The west side has more than its fair share of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, with Newtown perhaps being the jewel in the crown. A village built on the site of a medieval borough and a nature reserve makes for a great day out. Spot red squirrels, egrets and even a resident seal as you take a stroll around the estuary.

Brighstone is a pretty and busy village, nestled between the chalk downland to the north and stretching to the south-west facing coast. Well known for its waves and when they are big, Compton is great for surfing and when they are small, even better for bodyboarding and just general fun in the water. Swim round to the secret coves that can't be accessed by foot. Do let someone know if you are going swimming as this beach does not have a lifeguard but does have an independent lifeboat station.

They say west is best and that is certainly the case when it comes to sunsets. The beach at Colwell provides a stunning display with Hurst Castle creating a dramatic silhouette across the Solent. Take a dip in the sea here for an evening swim followed by a drink at one of the few pubs and eateries nearby.
