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


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

## 'Ask for Alan' initiative

We're pleased to announce 'Ask for Alan' a new initiative we've introduced to support some of our male customers.

Earlier this year, we began working closely with The Isle of Wight Prostate Cancer Support Group, a dedicated team of volunteers who provide education, testing, and support to men affected by prostate cancer – as well as to their partners and families.

To help raise awareness and offer practical support to those who may need it, we've introduced 'Ask for Alan.' Men travelling with us who may experience urinary incontinence can discreetly request support by going to any customer service point or retail outlet at our ports or on board and ask for 'a package for Alan' to receive a small blue envelope containing a male incontinence pad and disposal bag.

We've also introduced 'Bins for Boys' – one cubicle in each male toilet now has a clearly marked disposal bin, helping customers travel with dignity, comfort and confidence.

## MONKEY HAVEN CELEBRATES 15 YEARS

Since opening in 2010, Monkey Haven has rescued hundreds of creatures in need, from tiny songbirds to mighty Siamangs.

In 1999, founder Don Walser bought a muddy field on the Isle of Wight and started planning a haven for rescued monkeys and birds of prey. With the help of friends, family, and countless supporters, he turned it into an award-winning animal sanctuary.



Monkey Haven specialises in primate care and is home to over 19 species, including the singing Lar gibbons, mighty Siamangs and Mueller's gibbons, plus Mangabeys, Colobus monkeys, Javan langurs, critically endangered Cotton-top tamarins and many more.

Catch the keeper talks throughout the day to learn about the amazing residents and how they came to be at the Haven. Many were rescued from tragic situations, found tied up in airports, or badly neglected by their previous owners.

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# Autumn gold

The season of crunchy leaves and pumpkin spice lattes is upon us and it's the ideal time to plan a little trip to the Isle of Wight. Slip into those wellies and sling on your best bobble hat as we've got plenty of autumnal activities to keep the whole family entertained.

The Island's forests are a riot of orange and golden hues every autumn.

To kick off your autumnal adventures, consider heading to the scenic village of Newtown for a spot of seasonal bird spotting. Once a thriving medieval settlement (ravaged by both the plague and a French skirmish soon after), it's now home to just a cluster of quaint cottages and a 17th-century town hall. Head down through the fields and across the wooden boardwalk to Newtown Creek, where you'll find one of the best spots on the Island for birdwatching. Winged visitors to the riverbanks and marshes near here include Eurasian wigeon, black-tailed godwits, common redshank and even red-breasted mergansers. Binoculars recommended.

For something a little more adrenaline-inducing (to keep away those autumn chills), hop on a mountain bike and take to the 200 miles of cycle trails, tracks and bridle paths that crisscross the Isle of Wight. The bravest of souls can consider the Chalk Ridge Extreme (with 'extreme' certainly being the key word here), a 53-mile chalk and mud track route weaving past Carisbrooke Castle, the Mottistone Longstone and across some of our steepest hills; it should take the best part of eight hours to complete. For a gentler, more family-friendly alternative, take a sedate cycle from Quarr Abbey through the woods to Binstead and down into Ryde, finishing up on The Esplanade for a dark-chilli hot chocolate at The Chocolate Apothecary.

# THE BOATHOUSE THE PUB ON THE BEACH




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The coastline from Brook Bay to Compton Bay is one of the best stretches to go fossil hunting.

If you're still keen to witness some more local wildlife, then it's the perfect time to go looking for red squirrels (as it's their busiest time of year). Start off at Parkhurst Forest, a dense and leafy mix of ancient woodland, Napoleonic oak plantations and 20th-century pine forest, where King James I supposedly once hunted wild deer. Early mornings and late afternoons are the best times to drop by, when those furry ginger critters will be busy looking for fresh hazelnuts and pine nuts amongst the trees. Alternatively, head southeast to the tranquil village of Alverstone and the designated red squirrel hide at Alverstone Mead nature reserve. Conveniently protected from the elements, extra quiet visitors are in with a good chance of catching a squirrel sighting here, come rain or shine.

Perhaps dinosaurs are more likely to float your autumnal boat, in which case fossil hunting is a great activity to add to the schedule. The Isle of Wight is said to be one of the richest sources of dinosaur remains in Europe and the sandy shoreline between Brook Bay and Compton Bay is one of the best stretches of coast to go hunting.



Weather not playing ball? Head to Island Gems and learn all about the Isle of Wight's gems and fossils or book a guided fossil hunting trip for a brighter day.

Fossils from over 20 different species have been found on the sands here, some dating back 125 million years. And if you're struggling to tell the difference between an iguanodon rib and a common pebble, then fear not, year-round fossil walks can be arranged, including National Trust hunts during October half term. If those waves are just too rough though, pop into Island Gems, set in a historic thatched cottage in Godshill, where you can pick up all manner of amber, gems and fossilised remains to keep as a memento instead.


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

When that peckish feeling starts to creep up on you, make tracks to one of our characterful country pubs (bonus points if they come with rustic oak beams, comfy wooden settles and a roaring open fire). Options include The Sun at Calbourne, a newly refurbished pub with tasteful, sage-coloured interiors and a farm-to-fork dining ethos. The beef and lamb come from animals raised in the village, while you can also pick up locally-laid eggs from the bar. Alternatively, on the hills above Carisbrooke, you'll find The Blacksmiths, a historic roadside inn (reputed to be 400 years old), that comes with some pretty unbeatable countryside views. Especially popular with local food enthusiasts (just check their Google reviews), it's the ideal spot to recharge before heading back out into the drizzle.



The Sun Inn at Calbourne is newly refurbished with a cosy sage-coloured interior. The farm-to-fork dining ethos will ensure you're well fuelled for your autumn explorations.

Finally, what could be more autumnal than donning your best knitted jumper and spending an enlightening afternoon in a warm and toasty museum? Try Brading Roman Villa for starters, where the western wing of a grand 4th-century home has been uncovered and preserved. Look out for the mosaic of the snake-haired mythical figure Medusa, as well as a depiction of Bacchus, god of wine, laid out in tiny tiles.



Once the home of photographer Julia Margaret Cameron, Dimbola Museum and Galleries has a life-size bronze of iconic rock 'n' roller Jimi Hendrix outside.

If you're heading west instead, don't miss Dimbola Museum and Galleries, set just a stone's throw from the lapping waves of Freshwater Bay. Once the home of pioneering Victorian photographer Julia Margaret Cameron, it now includes modern photographic exhibitions, a curated collection of Julia's groundbreaking portraits and a recreation of her 19th-century bedroom.

## Fiesta of the Dead at Blackgang Chine 24–30 October

The chance to explore some of the Island's most infamous haunted sites, from Ventnor Botanic Garden and Arreton Barns to picturesque Shanklin Old Village, awaits those brave enough to join Marc Tuckey and his team. These atmospheric, lantern-lit tours blend history, mystery and mischief, bringing the Island's darkest tales to life. Keep an eye on their Facebook page for upcoming dates and prepare for an evening of jump scares, eerie alleyways and goosebumps galore. Suitable for fearless kids aged 13+ and grown-ups alike.

## THE ISLAND'S HAUNTED HISTORY

Sometimes only the real thing will do. If pumpkins and grumpkins aren't enough to send a shiver down your spine, why not take things into your own hands? Investigate some of the Island's haunted hot-spots, complete with horrible histories and gruesome mysteries fit for the scariest of slasher movies!

## Knighton Gorges

Two weathered stone gateposts on Knighton Shute are all that remain of the once-grand Knighton Manor, a house steeped in wealth, scandal and a vengeful curse. In 1821, its final owner ordered the entire estate demolished on his deathbed to keep it from his estranged heirs. Ever since, locals and ghost-hunters alike have claimed to see the manor reappear on New Year's Eve, windows glowing, candlelight flickering and music drifting through the night. Even if you miss the big night, keep your ears open – phantom carriage wheels have been heard clattering over the long-forgotten cobble path. The Island's "most cursed spot" promises spine-tingling suspense for those patient enough to wait.

## Carisbrooke Castle

Nearly a millennium of battles, sieges and political intrigue have left Carisbrooke Castle with more than a few ghost stories. Charles I spent his final year captive behind the towering walls before his execution in 1649 and visitors still claim to spot the shadowy figure of the 'Grey Lady' along the battlements. The most chilling? The distant cries and ghoulish face of young servant girl, Elizabeth Ruffin, can be seen peering up from the bottom of the 150-foot-deep well, where she tragically fell in 1632.

## Ventnor Botanic Garden

Beneath the tropical palms of Ventnor Botanic Garden lies a far darker history. From 1869 to 1964, the Royal National Hospital for Tuberculosis stood here before its demolition in 1969, offering rest and treatment to thousands who sadly never left. Visitors today speak of lights flickering in empty rooms, lifts moving on their own, the faint echo of coughs through the night air and a distinct, unsettling smell drifting from the Temperance House and its tunnels. It's a paradise by day, but by night, the gardens feel like the stories of a darker era come to life.



Buried beneath Ventnor Botanic Garden lies a mysterious 350 foot long vaulted roofed tunnel. The only evidence of its existence is an unassuming gate hidden in the undergrowth.

Whether you're herding tiny terrors through pumpkin patches, braving the Island's most haunted spots at midnight or dancing with skeletons under the stars, the Isle of Wight knows how to do Halloween with a twist. Pack layers, bring a torch and prepare for a few chills (that aren't just from the sea breeze). Happy haunting!

# *An Island of literary connections*

With the Isle of Wight Literary Festival taking place 9–12 October, we delve into the Island's rich literary history, spanning from Jane Austen, Alfred, Lord Tennyson and Charles Dickens through to the modern-day writers inspired by the Island's natural beauty.



Farringford is a Grade I Listed Building and was the main residence of the Poet Laureate Alfred, Lord Tennyson from 1853 until his death in 1892.

With its dramatic landscapes and rugged coastlines, the Island has long been a destination for poets, novelists and artists, inspiring musings on the sublime – the vastness and power of nature – in the works of the Romantic poets. Perhaps most famously, Victorian Poet Laureate Alfred, Lord Tennyson and his wife Emily resided at the neo-Gothic house Farringford from 1853 until his death in 1892. Tennyson wrote many of his works on the Island, including the metaphorical meditation Crossing the Bar, which was composed while crossing the Solent.



Tennyson wrote many of his works at Farringford, which has been meticulously restored and redecorated in a late 19th-century style.

A striking monument to the Victorian Poet Laureate stands on the highest point of downland in West Wight. Once known as High Down, it's now named after the poet himself. His home became a meeting place for writers, artists and intellectuals, with Anne Thackeray Ritchie writing: "Everybody is either a genius, or a poet, or a painter or peculiar in some way", after a visit to Freshwater in 1865. Amongst visitors to the house were children's authors Lewis Carroll and Margaret Gatty. The house and gardens are now open to visitors during the summer months, with guests invited to immerse themselves in history at the former home of one of England's most famous authors.

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The Isle of Wight's oldest visitor attraction, Shanklin Chine, was beloved by Jane Austen and John Keats.

But it wasn't just the majestic cliffs of the West Wight that inspired writers. The Island's oldest visitor attraction, Shanklin Chine, captured the imagination of the earlier literary figures, with Jane Austen calling it "lovely" and John Keats remarking on its natural beauty. In a letter to a friend, Keats wrote: "the wondrous Chine is a very great lion". It's believed to have inspired his poem *Endymion*, which opens with the line "a thing of beauty is a joy for ever". The sentiment rings true as today, visitors can still visit the chine, as well as dine and stay at Keats Cottage, the house once rented by the Romantic poet.

Travelling south, the sleepy village of Bonchurch is rumoured to be where Charles Dickens began writing *David Copperfield*. With the support of local historians and the Charles Dickens Fellowship, Alan Cartwright, of Haviland Cottage in Bonchurch, has researched Dickens's connections to the village and concluded that some of his characters were based on Islanders.




Notably, he suggests that the character Mr Dick from *David Copperfield* was inspired by a fellow of the same name, befriended by Dickens during his time in Bonchurch. Cartwright also asserts that Miss Havisham from *Great Expectations* was based on a local, Margaret Dick, who lived in the village. Like the wealthy spinster depicted in Dickens's novel, Miss Dick was jilted at the altar and became a recluse, rarely seen in public life.

While the Victorians were undoubtedly charmed by the Island, it remained a holiday destination for writers in the 20th century. The prolific children's author Enid Blyton stayed at a cottage in Seaview in 1935, and while there is no definitive evidence that her Famous Five series was influenced by her visits to the Island, those familiar with the books can easily draw comparisons between the stories of wrecks and rugged coastlines and the Island's landscapes. More recently, Seaview became the setting for Georgina Moore's novel *The Garnett Girls*, which tells an intriguing tale of three sisters, love and history, with a background of the beaches and villages of the Isle of Wight.

With its rich literary history, the Island is a fitting place for an event celebrating the written word. Now in its twelfth year, the Isle of Wight Literary Festival draws writers and thinkers from around the United Kingdom to discuss literature in a setting that has the subject deeply

embedded in its history and culture. Among the speakers at this year's Isle of Wight Literary Festival is Natasha Edwards, author of *The Goodness of Garlic* and Managing Director of The Garlic Farm. Natasha grew up on her family farm on the Isle of Wight, surrounded by rolling hills, in a location that is now a designated UNESCO biosphere reserve. Still today, writers are inspired by the natural beauty of the Island – and its bounty.

Jane Austen wrote in *Mansfield Park*: "She thinks of nothing but the Isle of Wight, and she calls it the Island, as if there were no other island in the world." The quote has been claimed by Islanders and can be found inscribed on jewellery and memorabilia, for those who want to keep a little of the Island's charm with them. Because, to those inspired by the Isle of Wight, there truly is no other Island that compares.


Grab some local fizz and a bottle of Mermaid Zest Gin and celebrate the best the Wight has to offer this Christmas.





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# *From concrete cage to Island paradise: Benji & Balu*

If you're visiting the Isle of Wight and love animals, there's a heartwarming story waiting to be discovered. At the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary in Sandown, two rescued brown bears – Benji and Balu – have traded a life of hardship in Azerbaijan for a safe, spacious home by the sea.

## FROM DESPAIR TO HOPE

Benji and Balu's journey began in Azerbaijan, where they spent years confined to a small, featureless concrete cage. There was no grass under their paws, no shade from the sun and no pool to cool down in.

Their rescue became reality thanks to the combined efforts of international animal welfare organisations and the dedicated team at the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary. Months of planning went into the operation – from negotiating their release and securing specialist transport to ensuring the bears were medically cleared for travel and preparing their new home.



The purpose-built habitat has been built to meet the brothers' physical and emotional needs, which includes a playful grapple!

## BUILDING A NEW LIFE – LITERALLY

Welcoming two brown bears to the Isle of Wight was no small feat. The Sanctuary's team worked tirelessly to design and build a 3,500sqm, purpose-built habitat to meet the brothers' physical and emotional needs.

The result is an impressive enclosure with open grassy spaces, shady woodland, natural climbing structures and a large pool for swimming and play. Specially designed enrichment equipment encourages the bears to forage, climb and explore, stimulating both mind and body.



The large pool gives the bears ample space to splash around.

None of this would have been possible without an extraordinary show of community spirit. A fundraising campaign, supported by animal lovers far and wide, raised over £250,000 to turn the vision into reality. Local and national businesses donated time, skills, services and materials – from construction and landscaping to transport and specialist equipment. This generosity created far more than a habitat; it gave Benji and Balu a second chance at life. The debt can only truly be repaid in seeing the fruits of these endeavours – two happy, healthy and contented bears, thriving in their new home.

## SETTLING INTO ISLAND LIFE

When the bears arrived in June, after travelling over 3,000 miles, they stepped onto grass for the very first time. Since that moment, their transformation has been remarkable. Their coats, once dull and patchy, are now thick and glossy; their muscles stronger; their eyes bright with curiosity.



On their day of arrival, the bears were curious but tentative.

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Watching Benji and Balu transform and gain confidence has been a magical experience for the team at the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary.

Benji, the more adventurous, was quick to explore every corner, climbing frame and enrichment toy. Balu, initially more cautious, has gained confidence daily, revealing a playful side that delights visitors.

"They're unrecognisable from the animals we first saw," says Lawrence Bates, CEO of the Wildheart Animal Sanctuary. "Seeing them splashing, digging and climbing is magical. This is what every wild animal deserves – a life worth living."

### MISCHIEF, MEALS AND MEMORABLE MOMENTS

The brothers have shown a fondness for digging – much to the amusement (and occasional frustration) of the maintenance team. "We fix one hole and they start another," jokes Lawrence. "But it's a great sign – it means they feel safe enough to just be bears."

Their diet is now varied and nourishing, including fruit, vegetables and, for the first time in their lives, meat – vital for their health and development. Visitors often watch with fascination as the bears forage for food hidden by their carers, displaying natural hunting and problem-solving skills.

### A GLOBAL AUDIENCE

Benji and Balu have captured hearts far beyond the Isle of Wight. The Sanctuary's live webcams attract viewers from around the world, with thousands of views from as far as Australia and the United States. Their rescue story has also reached national audiences through BBC's *The One Show*, shining a spotlight on their remarkable journey.

### SEE THE BEARS FOR YOURSELF

Whether you're visiting the Isle of Wight for a day or a week, meeting Benji and Balu is an experience not to be missed. Their story – from a stark concrete cage in Azerbaijan to a lush, purpose-built sanctuary – is a testament to what compassion, teamwork and public support can achieve.

As Lawrence reflects: "The public has given these bears the life they were always meant to have – and in return, they've given us joy, laughter and a whole lot of digging."

# Inspirational Islanders: Toby Jenkins

## Distiller, Isle of Wight Distillery

**Originally born in Ryde, Toby then lived in New Zealand for three years as a child, before returning in 2008. He studied at Platform One and then completed a music degree at Leeds Conservatoire. He has now been working as a distiller for Isle of Wight Distillery, home of Mermaid, for the past five years.**

Established in 2014, the Distillery recently celebrated the 10-year anniversary of Mermaid Gin and has marked the occasion with the production of a limited edition gin. The special batch of just 1,500 bottles sees its signature spirit reimagined by enhancing the locally foraged rock samphire with the unique addition of coastal fig leaves to provide a deeper expression of the brand's coastal roots.

"The Isle of Wight really is one of the most beautiful places in the country. With its amazing weather and beaches, it's the kind of place I would come on holiday, so to live here is an absolute dream. I love the fact that I can go to work in the morning and be swimming in the sea by the afternoon.

My favourite place on the Island would have to be Ryde Cinema, walking in there is like stepping back in time and it's so affordable!

Steephill Cove is my favourite beach. It's so serene and peaceful. It's also a special place because my partner and I had one of our first dates there. Plus, if it's the right time of year, I can snag a bit of rock samphire for making gin.

Walking the dog up Culver Down with an ice cream at the top is always a delight. As long as it isn't too windy, the views out over Sandown are spectacular.

It might be an obvious choice, but my top event has to be the Isle of Wight Festival. I've been either attending or performing there for 10+ years and it's always such a good weekend. To have such a major festival on our doorstep really shouldn't be taken for granted.

If I only had an hour on the Isle of Wight, I would go and grab a fro-yo from French Franks in Ryde and then play some pool at Rocket Ronnies."



Our most scenic ferry crossing lies in the west Wight, thanks partly to the drive through the New Forest and the journey along the Lymington estuary – which is complete with mudflats and salt marshes dotted with many species of water birds. Wightlink's ferry docks in the historic market town of Yarmouth. This quaint town is a hub of activity and a draw for foodies and boutique shoppers alike, with its excellent restaurants and pubs alongside the cobbled streets lined with independent shops.

The rugged coastline along the iconic Military Road is home to some of the best fossil-hunting beaches in the UK. With over 25 species of dinosaurs discovered to have lived on the Island, Brook Beach is a must for any budding or established palaeontologist as at this time of year, with the rougher seas, you have a good chance of discovering a fossil or two. Plus, the Iguanodon foot casts along the mud flats are a fascinating find.

# Central



**Steeped in history and heritage, the central villages and towns of the Island all have a unique and interesting story to tell.**

At the heart is the county town of Newport. A traditional market town centred around two squares with St Thomas' Church at the centre. Also known as the Minster, it is the final resting place of Princess Elizabeth, daughter of King Charles I. Within the church, a monument to the princess, commissioned by Queen Victoria, is carved in white marble.

Carisbrooke, on the outskirts of Newport, is famed for its castle, which was most notably the prison of King Charles I during the Civil War.

For a local shopping experience, nestled within the rolling fields of the village of Arreton is Arreton Barns. The Island's largest arts and crafts centre showcases the best in local artisans, artists and craftspeople – from glass blowing and ceramics to leather work and paintings.



# Inspirational Islanders: Bob Simpson

## Managing Director, Goddards Brewery

**Having moved to the Isle of Wight from London in the 1980s, Bob started his brewing journey in the mid-1990s, founding Ventnor Brewery. Since then, he has worked at Bass, Molson Coors and Yates' Brewery. Beer is one of Bob's main passions, but he's also keen on sports and recently played a charity match at Twickenham as a 'super-vet' for the local Hurricanes rugby union team. He can often be found building and renovating properties in his time off.**

The oldest brewery on the Isle of Wight and one of the first independent craft beer producers in the UK, Goddards was acquired by Powder Monkey Brewing Co Ltd in January this year. From the purpose-built state-of-the-art brewery at Hale Common, Goddards produce a range of award-winning beers, from full-bodied favourites to a light and refreshing lager.

"As a place to live and work, the Isle of Wight is hard to beat. Most of my mates in London went to work in the City, but for me, life is about quality and not quantity. I've travelled the world three times and have always ended up back on the Island. Only New Zealand even came close.

We regularly deliver Goddards beer to Quarr Abbey and it's become one of my favourite places. It's wonderfully tranquil and I love the bees and the pigs. There are farmers in our family and that must be the reason. This year, Goddards has brewed Apiary Ale, a Belgian-style beer using honey from Quarr.

My favourite beach is Priory Bay without a doubt. I have family who have lived in and around St Helens and Seaview for generations. It's a stunning beach and it's where I grew up and feel most at home.

Culver Down is where I'd walk my dog every day. The views out over Sandown Bay are amazing at any time of the year. A walk around the headland is a really good place to clear your mind, ready to start the day.

In terms of events, Goddards provide beer backstage at the Isle of Wight Festival. Although we're technically working, it's great to be alongside the other Wight Marque suppliers who have been chosen to look after the artists. We have a lot of fun.

If I only had an hour on the Island, I'd take the kids to the beach. It's what the Isle of Wight is all about."
